





This year we are bursting with pride because it is the Twentieth Year of our Jazz & Heritage Festival. Two decades ago this festival began as a small, tentative venture in Beauregard Square outside the French Quarter under the aegis of the jazz impressario, George Wein.

Forty years ago, 1949, I began my entrepreneurial career by producing my first concert in association with a famous New Orleans clarinetist, who was also my band leader. "Edmond Hall and George Wein present FROM BRASS BANDS TO BEBOP" was the title of the evening and of course the brass band reference was to New Orleans.

In 1950 I opened a jazz club in Boston called "Storyville -The Birthplace of Jazz." Again, a New Orleans reference. The music played at Storyville featured all styles of jazz played by artists like Bird, Dizzy, Duke, Basie, Louis, etc.

I guess it was in those days that my inevitable love affair with New Orleans - the city - was conceived.

In the fifties and sixties I produced two great festivals in Newport, Rhode Island: the

Little did we realize that this initial celebration of our music and culture would enjoy such spectacular growth and achievement, and become a major contributor to the economic life of our city.



A Festival of Praise:

the Heritage Fair By J.B. Borders


Of all the many wonderful attractions at the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival, none generates more enthusiasm or energy than the gospel tent at the Heritage Fair. From late morning to early evening during each of the six days of celebration on the grassy infield of the Fair Grounds, the gospel tent pulses with the beat of "good news" music.

Whether the performers are a quartet attired in conservative suits or members of a mass choir donning resplendently colored robes, the singing messengers inevitably elicit waves of righteous reaction from an appreciative audience in and around the tent. Hand clapping, holy dancing, call-and-response, testifying and, yes, even an occasional possession

by the Holy Ghost, all work to keep the musical heat at a fevered pitch.

The Jazz Fest's gospel tent, sponsored by Rhodes Enterprises and WYLD Radio, is a homing ground at the Heritage Fair for young, old, black, white, locals, tourists, true believers and infidels, shade seekers, heat seekers, and music lovers of all description. In short, it's the place to be, offering perhaps the finest showcase of Louisiana's gospel music.

The gospel tent is now a landmark at the Jazz Fest—and has been for much of the festival's existence. The seeds of its presence go back to the very first festival in '69, says Allison Minor Kaslow, one of the event's co-founders.



"We made a little covering over the stage that year," Kaslow said, "because Sister Gertrude Morgan, who was booked for a performance, told us the Lord didn't want her to sing under an open sky."

According to Sherman Washington, coordinator of the festival's gospel portion, an actual tent was introduced when the Jazz Fest outgrew its initial site at Congo Square and relocated to the Fair Grounds in 1972.

As Sherman recalls it, festival producer Quint Davis simply came up to him one year and said, "I had a dream of a gospel tent."

"That's how the tradition of the tent started," Washington continued. "But the tent we had that first year only held about 200 people. And it stayed crowded. We had only booked about five groups but the people wanted to hear so much gospel that we had to have some groups come out twice."

In later years, Washington added, larger tents were found, but they, too, were inadequate for the numbers of people hankering to hear the Fair's expanding roster of religious performers. "Finally, a few years ago, Quint told me he had found the largest tent available."

But even the current tent, with over 2,000 seats, is often insufficient for the crowds, which can exceed 10,000 people at a time, who will flock to see some or all of the 66 gospel groups on this year's schedule.


That gospel has been a major component of the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival for the past twenty years should come as no surprise, for it has been a cornerstone of the area's culture for longer than most people dare to remember.

From as far back as the 1850s, descriptions of African-American religious ceremonies in New Orleans make mention of a "responsorial" style of singing among the participants. By the mid-1880s, "Negro Spirituals" would be recognized as a distinct musical hybrid fusing Protestant hymns and Old Testament references with African harmonies in a more or less five-toned scale. But it wouldn't, be until around 1915 that the more upbeat stylings of "gospel" began in Alabama and spread throughout Black communities in the South.

By the late 1920s the new gospel sound, with its more frequent allusions to Jesus and the teachings of the New Testament, had reached New Orleans. Ironically, this occurred around the time that Mahalia Jackson was leaving the city for the colder clime of Chicago, from whence she would launch a celebrated gospel solo career.

Gospel's primary appeal was and is its message of endurance in the face of adversity. Its lyrics speak of the conviction to overcome seemingly insurmountable obstacles. The music's ability to address the combined oppressions under which Black people have always struggled gave it an acceptance beyond the confines of the church. As a result, gospel enjoyed enormous popularity in the larger, secular Black community.

In the '30s New Orleans radio was instrumental in furthering gospel's appeal as cleaning companies and shoe stores,



among others, sponsored broadcasts of the music in an attempt to capture the city's African-American consumer market.

In no time at all, recordings, song battles, gospel concerts and other showcases became commonplace throughout the city. The competition for acceptance by audiences stimulated innovations in gospel music writing, arranging, publishing and performing that helped spawn a small industry in the religious music field. Gospel also became a training ground for scores of New Orleans singers and musicians who would launch careers in rhythm & blues and jazz.

Some of the local gospel groups achieving recognition during this period were the Second Zion Four, the Duncan Brothers, the Humming Four, the Southern Harps (among whose members in the early '40s were both Bessie Griffin and Linda Hopkins) and the Soul Comforters, the group in which Henry Roeland Byrd, aka Professor Longhair, got his start.

If the early days of gospel had been dominated by the quartet style of singing — tight harmonies sandwiched between syncopating bass lines and high tenor leads — the post-World War II decades would witness the rise of large choirs organized within churches and in the community-at-large. Since the sixties, groups like the Gospel Soul Children, the Desire Community Choir and the Greater St. Stephen Baptist Church Mass Choir have risen to positions of prominence in local gospel circles.

In the '80s there seems to be balanced appreciation for a wide range of gospel. And Sherman Washington, along with

his staff, has taken pains to see that the whole mix of the music's flavors can be sampled at the Heritage Fair. There is the sound of contemporary gospel, personified by groups like Sammy Berfect & Dimensions of Faith, who utilize many of the instruments and arrangements common to secular black music. There is traditional quartet singing, persuasively rendered by groups like the Zion Harmonizers. There are choirs from several Protestant denominations and even a couple of Catholic ones. There are all-male and all-female groups. There are groups from the inner city and several from outlying communities. There are youth choirs, senior choirs, and mass choirs of all sizes. There are groups specializing in classic ballads like "Touch Me, Lord Jesus," "Amazing Grace" and "Precious Lord." And, of course, there is plenty of hard-driving, foot-stomping, shout-inducing, **old-time** gospel.

In addition to the blow-out at the Fair Grounds, there is a special night concert on May 1 featuring Grammy award-winners Al Green, BeBe & CeCe Winans, The Staple Singers along with local crowd pleasers, The Gospel Soul Children and the Zion Harmonizers.

Always, however, there is in gospel at the Jazz Fest a fervent conviction to celebrate the Lord through song. And it's always unfailingly captivating, contagious and uplifting.

"People can't seem to get enough of it," says Washington. His face breaks into a contented smile as he adds, echoing James Weldon Johnson's famous quotation attributed to the Lord surveying the world he had created, "And that's good."

DANCING CAT RECORDS

DANCING CAT RECORDS features a variety of solo piano and solo guitar releases, and is planning to concentrate on releases by the late New Orleans R & B pianist, James Booker. A subsidiary label, HAWAIIAN SLACK KEY GUITAR RECORDS, is recording the artists playing the traditional solo finger-picking styles unique to the Islands. This music is very beautiful and full of the spirit of *Aloha*.

This re-mixed version of the 1974 album classic brings Fess' piano up to the forefront and adds two new unreleased songs. The late Professor Longhair significantly influenced Fats Domino, Dr. John, James Booker, Huey Smith, Allen Toussaint, Art Neville, Henry Butler, and many others. His unique piano style always inspired dancing.*

The scene was a small cafe in the central city section of New Orleans. Quint Davis and Allison Minor were young white promoters with long hair. His was blond, hers brunette. Sherman Washington was a middle-aged black singer/manager with smatterings of grey in his neat, close cropped Afro. Davis and Minor were planning a music festival for Congo Square and wanted to include gospel in the program. They had been told that Sherman might be able to assist them in finding some groups. Washington agreed to help.

As a result of that initial meeting over twenty years ago, three gospel groups were booked for the first New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival. This year there will be 66. And as it has been since that first festival in 1969, the task of arranging and coordinating the gospel portion of the Jazz Fest falls squarely on the shoulders of Sherman Washington, who continues to be a bulwark of the New Orleans gospel community after nearly fifty years of activity.

If handling gospel for the Jazz Fest was all Washington did the entire year, it would be plenty. But working for the festival is only one of many efforts the 63 year-old dynamo makes on behalf of gospel.

Washington, a truck driver for the past 35 years with Boh Bros. Construction Co., also co-hosts a Sunday morning gospel program on WYLD-AM. But he is best known as a member of the Zion Harmonizers, one of the country's most highly regarded quartet-style gospel groups, which is celebrating its 50th anniversay this year.

Sherman was just a teenager when he joined the Zion Harmonizers in 1942. "Gospel just came up in me," he recalls. "This is the only music I know."

Though Washington is the senior member of the group today, back then the Zion Harmonizers were led by Benjamin Maxon, who founded the group in 1939.

Maxon was the nephew of Alberta Johnson, leader of the Southern Harps, one of the preeminent gospel groups of the 1940s. Taking their name from the Zion City neighborhood where they were formed, the Harmonizers got much of their early seasoning by appearing on programs with the Southern Harps.

By 1954, Washington had matured into the group's lead singer and succeeded Maxon as manager. He immediately started working to secure appearances for the Zion Harmonizers throughout the city. He remembers pleading with local disc jockeys like Dr. Daddy-O (Vernon Winslow) for air time and contacting countless ministers about performances in their churches. It was often a struggle, but the hard work eventually paid off.

Today, the Zion Harmonizers are in demand as a major attraction in their own right, with constant engagements throughout the United States and regular tours to Europe. Washington says the group does the equivalent of 9 months worth of dates throughout the year, including benefit appearances for area churches and people in distress.

Sherman has witnessed a great many changes in gospel music over the past fifty years, not the least of which are

monetary. "In the days when I was just starting out," he points out, "gospel concerts only cost 25 cents to attend — forty, at the most, for big-time performers." Today, tickets for gospel performances often cost ten dollars and more.

Airplane travel for performers is certainly more prevalent now than in the '40s or '50s, according to Washington. And there has been a revolution in costuming.

"Years ago, the men almost always wore black full tuxedos or matching black suits. The most variation you'd see was if someone was in grey. It's not like now where you can see groups wearing lots of different get-ups."

The Zion Harmonizers have experienced changes of their own in the past five decades as well. There have been several personnel changes, as members either retired or died. The current group consists of Sherman's brother Nolan as co-lead; tenor Howard Bowie; solo and lead quitarist Willie Williams, Jr.; Louis Jones, Jr., with the deep bass voice; and second tenor Brazella Brisco.

What has remained constant about the group, however, is its devotion to the quartet style of gospel singing (called that despite the fact that most groups are actually quintets with swinging lead singers). The group, with two record albums of its own and inclusion in as many more anthologies, still performs as much a cappella as they do with musical accompaniment. There is renewed interest in their brand of gospel after several lean years in the '60s and '70s — years during which they steadfastly refused offers to cross over into rhythm & blues and eschewed many of the innovations associated with contemporary gospel.

"Contemporary gospel gives you a thrill and keeps you clapping," Sherman says, "but the real feel is in traditional gospel. And that will never die."



INSTITUTIONALIZING THE JAZZ FEST THE NEW ORLEANS JAZZ AND HERITAGE FOUNDATION

One of the more remarkable accomplishments during the 20 years of the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Festival has been the establishment, growth and development of the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Foundation Board. The broad base of local participation of the Board and its consistent commitment to supporting the development and maintenance of the local heritage in music and the arts is unique and unparalleled in the music world. Through this community based Board of Directors. its staff, and the Festival producers, the Jazz Fest has developed into a world class event, and the Foundation Board has become a model of institution building in the local community and the music industry.

The Foundation Board is charged with the responsibility of securing and managing the resources needed to put on the annual Festival. But, over the years the Jazz and Heritage Foundation has expanded its role. Since 1979, the Foundation has operated a grants program for local artists and art organizations providing critical resources during a period of severe cutbacks in government and private foundation funding for the arts. In recent years the Foundation has also taken on the operation of the local public radio station, WWOZ, and is currently considering the establishment of a Jazz School to nurture the development of young, local musicians.

Today, the Jazz and Heritage Foundation is an active, year-round organization with a paid staff and varied programs. It manages a million dollar budget and exercises significant influence in the local arts community. The growth of this remarkable organization and the Festival which preceded it is one of the great New Orleans stories.

George Wein, the New York based producer who conceived the idea of a New Orleans music festival and heritage fair, recognized from the very beginning that he needed a local base to put on a successful event. Wein approached local architect, Arthur Davis, whose son, Quint, was working with George Wein to put on the initial Jazz Festival in 1969. Wein and Arthur Davis went to a local bank and secured a loan for \$10,000.00 to put on the first Jazz

Fest. The first Festival was held in Congo Square (now Armstrong Park) and, by all accounts, the first Jazz Fest had more musicians playing than audience in attendance.

Arthur Davis relates that despite these humble beginnings he decided to continue to work with George Wein and his son, Quint, to develop the annual event. He formed a local advisory board, of which he was named chairman, and set out to raise local resources to support the Festival. According to Davis, raising money to put on the Festival in the early years was a difficult and thankless job. A few local companies did provide support, but the Festival operated in the red for the first five (5) years of its existence.

It wasn't until the Fair Grounds was secured in 1972 as the site of the Festival, and a national sponsor, Schlitz Beer,



was secured in 1973 that the Festival began to show signs of its current potential. Davis says that despite the difficulties of those early years, there was always a commitment to excellence that laid the basis for later growth.

In 1976, Judge Gerald Federoff took over the Board chairmanship. By this time the event had become a local success offering the best weekend of music and food to be found in the area. But, the Board remained a loosely knit coalition of white civic and business leaders who came together a few months before the Festival to give input to the producers. During Federoff's tenure as Board chairman, much of that would change. Under Federoff, a Board Charter was adopted, regular meetings were scheduled, and a few Black members were added to the Board.

In 1979, the Festival came under attack from a Black community coalition which threatened a boycott of the Festival because of its lack of Black involvement in the decision-making related to the Festival. Most of the musicians and craftsmen were Blacks who performed and displayed their wares at the Festival, but only three of the 20 Board members were Black.

In response to the challenge, the Foundation Board expanded to thirty (30) members in '79 and 12 of those members were Black. Marion Kelly Murphy became the first Black president of the Board and under her leadership the Foundation began its steady development as an institution. Murphy relates that during that period, "The Foundation came to life by reaffirming its Charter and delineating its role from that of the producers. We invited more Blacks to serve on the Board and to participate in the annual fair. We established an agenda that included returning festival surplus to the community through an annual grants program. We appointed the first Director of the Foundation, John Murphy, to carry out that agenda." Marion Kelly Murphy's leadership gave form and substance to the Foundation and set the stage for the continued development of the Festival.

Sarah Meltzer, a local French Quarter



Boutique owner, followed Marion Murphy as Board president. During her tenure, the Foundation hired its first Black Director, Wallace Young, and expanded its grants program as the Festival grew into a tourist attraction and a major musical event. It was also during Meltzer's presidency that local community support for the Festival began to flourish.

In 1983, the Foundation was approached by a major national cigarette company which was willing to provide nearly a quarter million dollars in funding if the Festival would change its name to reflect the name brand of the cigarette. The Board refused and conducted the '83 Festival without a sponsor. The next year a concerted effort was made to get local sponsorship. The New Orleans community responded and the Festival has been on solid financial ground ever since.

Kalamu Salaam was the Foundation Director for the last two years of Meltzer's term, and Bill Rouselle became Board president in 1985. The Festival continued to grow realizing more than a half million dollar surplus in '85. The Foundation also began to look at long-range goals and objectives while continuing its grants program.

Arthur Pulitzer, head of the Wembly Tie Company, followed Rouselle as Board president in 1987. The Foundation took over operation of WWOZ radio under Pulitzer and the Festival continued its spectacular growth. Emilo "Monk" Dupre is the current Board president and Tom Dent is the Foundation Director.

The Jazz and Heritage Festival in its 20th year is a uniquely New Orleans institution, second only to Mardi Gras as a major tourist attraction. It is one of the world's major music events, and the organization which oversees its operation is a model for community based Foundations. The remarkable history of this institution's growth is truly one of the great New Orleans stories.

Santana The Neville Brothers

To inaugurate "The River Tent," the 20th annual New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival presents **Santana** and **The Neville Brothers.** The River Tent, located at the foot of Calliope Street behind the Convention Center, on the banks of the Mississippi River, is a new venue designed specifically to house the evening festivities.



A product of the San Francisco psychedelic rock scene in the late '60s. Santana pioneered the mixture of high voltage electric guitar blues and swinging Latin rhythms. His "Black Magic Woman" quickly became a signature song, and he went on to win fans around the world. Santana's interests extend far beyond a hit sound; he has recorded with a wide variety of musicians including jazz harpist/pianist Alice Coltrane and jazz pianist McCoy Tyner, both of whom are alumni of John Coltrane bands. Most recently, Santana has toured with saxophonist Wayne Shorter in an all-star group that included keyboardist Patrice Rushen.

The Neville Brothers are the living legends of contemporary New Orleans popular music. Art, Aaron, Charles and Cyril Neville have amassed an international following of devoted fans who have happily fallen under the spell of that wild "fiya on the bayou" sound which the Nevilles never fail to serve up, hot and spicy as a plate of red beans doused in hot sauce. The Neville Broth-




ers will feature selections from their newly released album **Yellow Moon** (A&M Records) which includes a range of traditional Mardi Gras Indian chants, songs from the sixties and Neville originals such as the important Black history song "Rosa Parks."




Jimmy Buffett & The Coral Reefer Band

Jimmy Buffett, with 16 albums to his credit, is one of the mavericks of

pop music who is willing to pay the cost to be his own boss. The Pascagoula, Mississippi native who graduated in 1969 from the University of Southern Mississippi with degrees in history and journalism decided to take up music as a career and headed east to Key West Florida where he worked on chartered fishing boats by day and played local bars by night. What distinguishes Buffett from a passel of pop artists is his artful songwriting abilities. "Hot Water," his latest release, features not only some of his finest songwriting but an outstanding edition of his Coral Reefer Band tackling Buffet originals and unique covers of contemporary songs, all of which are influenced by the music traditions of the south, the caribbean and Africa.




Malcolm "Mac" Rebennack, known worldwide as Dr. John "The Night Tripper" (a traditional New Orleans Voo-Doo personality), is a legendary figure on the contemporary music scene. His volatile mixture of New Orleans funk. showmanship, and traditional New Orleans piano playing creates delirium wherever he appears. Two solo piano recordings demonstrate his unique musical talents, and numerous group Lps plus frequent guest appearances as a vocalist and/or keyboardist with a wide range of jazz and pop artists only begin to suggest the range and depth of this musical giant. This night on the river will undoubtedly be a special gathering for the night people who love to boogie to the beat of an authentic New Orleans musical personality.

Art Blakey is widely considered the godfather of hard bop drumming and one of jazz's most important talent scouts and groomers of youthful talent. Playing with Art Blakey is often referred to as enrolling in the university of jazz. The list of Blakey alumni reads like a who's who of jazz talent, especially trumpeters: Clifford Brown, Lee Morgan, Freddie Hubbard, Wynton Marsalis, Terrance Blanchard and Wallace Rodney. But its the immediately recognizable hard driving, irrepressible Blakey beat with its steady sock cymbal, sizzling ride cymbal, and polyrhythmetic tom-toms that has endeared Blakey to millions of jazz lovers.

The New Orleans Expatriots will be featured in a special, one time appearance on tonight's program. Composed of veteran jazz musicians who all left New Orleans, at one time or another, to pursue a career in music, this group features a diverse aggregation of players with wide ranging experiences. Trumpeters Joe Newman and trombonist Ben-

ny Powell both made their marks with the Count Basie Orchestra, Saxophonist Plas Johnson and drummer Earl Palmer made California their home and are seminal session musicians. Saxophonist and arranger Harold Batiste was the musical director for Sonny & Cher and musical creative force behind the birth of the Dr. John persona. Pianist Ellis Marsalis, as a result of his long stint as jazz instructor at NOCCA, is both literally and figuratively the father figure of modern jazz in New Orleans. Bassist Peter "Chuck" Badie has recently returned to the music scene after a long health related retirement. Guitarist Ernie McLean is now mainstay on the West Coast scene.

Pianist and vocalist Harry Connick, Jr. is the latest NOCCA graduate to garner rave reviews from New York critics and jazz fans. His second album, "20" (Columbia Records), is a jazz best seller and has led to guest appearances on the Today show and numerous other television and radio programs. He is currently in high demand as a solo artist in New York City.



temporary gospel music. Their self-titled debut album won a Grammy, and their new album "Heaven" includes a hit single, "Hold Up The Light," featuring a cameo appearance by Whitney Houston. Through thrilling vocal work and a sense of professionalism in their work, BeBe (Benjamin) & CeCe (Priscilla) Winans have gained their place at the forefront of the inspirational music wing of contemporary gospel. Mixing elements of contemporary music with gospel messages, and employing their own

talents as vocalists, this is an exciting and important musical duo who profess that their music is "the strongest tool we have to change the world. We're trying to use the talent that was given to us to influence people to do good."



The Gospel Soul Children are a mammoth choir whose gospel renditions are marked by intricate arrangements and outstanding solo work from a host of featured vocalists. The Zion Harmonizers, on the other hand, sing in the traditional gospel quartet style: four part harmony, usually with four back-up vocalists and one lead vocalist. This year The Zion Harmonizers are celebrating 50 years, making them one of the oldest gospel groups in the country.

These two trumpeters are often identified as the most important musicians on the contemporary jazz scene. Miles Davis, a genius of modern music who apprenticed under Charlie Parker and went on to lead his own groups and spawn whole schools of jazz music. The list of sidemen who matured under his tutelage and who have gone on to make their own marks as leaders and performers is awesome. They include the likes of John Coltrane, Red Garland, Wayne Shorter, Herbie Hancock, Ron Carter, Tony Williams, Joe Zawinul, John Scofield and a host of others. Known for his brilliant use of space and his muted trumpet work, Miles Davis has been at the forefront of contemporary jazz for over 40 years. Wynton Marsalis, a New Orleans native, is contemporary jazz's most celebrated artist with eight



grammy awards and a host of other awards from music associations and community organizations. While touring with his sextet and continuing to record, Wynton Marsalis takes time to visit high schools and universities to give lectures and workshops in order to encourage future jazz musicians. Noted for his prowess as both a classical and jazz trumpeter, Wynton Marsalis is both a technician's dream and a player of great emotional warmth. This will be a special night when these two brass giants meet for a night of artistry on the river.



The Robert Cray Band represents the most popular reemergence of blues in the last ten years. Born in Georgia, raised all across America because his father was in the armed services, Robert Cray paid his blues dues while based in Tacoma, Washington. Displaying a vocal style whose hallmark is plaintive sincerity and a no frills approach to his lead guitar work, this former member of the Albert King band is widely hailed as the most charismatic blues artist to come along since B.B. King. Combining traditional blues with R&B and his own insights into human nature, Cray's songwriting abilities are what distinguishes him from the pack of blues artists, most of whom simply do covers of older materials or simple reworkings of older materials under the cover of "new" songs. The subject of numerous articles in the major media, Robert Cray has single-handedly put blues back on the map of popular music.





Complementing the headliner is Senegalese singer Youssou N'Dour who is West Africa's most popular singer. Possessed of one of the most extraordinary vocal instruments in contemporary music, Youssou N'Dour was tapped to be one of the headliners on the recent Amnesty International's Human Rights Now! tour. He has developed his own musical genre, "mbalax," which is a unique mixture of traditional African elements with western musi-

cal forms. He is widely respected for the messages of social upliftment in his songs as well as widely admired for his dazzling stage presence.

New Orleans' own Ivan Neville & The Room add the distintive New Orleans touch to tonight's proceedings. Son of lead vocalist, Aaron Neville of the Neville Brothers, Ivan is the latest in a long line of notables from New Orleans' major musical family. Between promoting his

debut Polygram album, "If My Ancestors Could See Me Now," and recording and touring with Keith Richards, Ivan Neville is a very busy young man. While not totally abandoning his root music, Ivan is interested in the latest directions in contemporary pop, and his high energy, intense brand of music will surely captivate you.

Guitarist George Benson is America's most successful crossover artist. 


Van Morrison



Vocalist and blues harpist Kim Wilson, drummer Fran Christina and acoustic/electric bassist Preston Hubbard (formerly of Roomful of Blues) round out the quartet.





The author of 15 million sellers, Allen Toussaint is New Orleans' most productive musician and producer. The producer and writer of classic New Orleans R&B hits such as "Mother-In-Law," "Fortune Teller," "Ten Thousand Dollar Reward," for the Minit label in the early sixties. Allen Toussaint has continued over the years to both write and produce hit records. The list of people he has produced or written songs for is a veritable who's who of contemporary pop. His "Southern Nights," which was a major hit for Glen Campbell, was designated by BMI as the most performed song of 1977. His most recent accolade is the 1987 Outer Critic Circle Award for "Outstanding Music in an Off Broadway Musical" for his score for Staggerlee. Flautist Kent Jordan is a NOCCA graduate and CBS recording artist who is making a name for himself on his chosen instrument — which is difficult in the jazz world which does not have many musicians who only play flute. His current album "Essence" has been atop the jazz charts and represents some of his finest recorded work. He is the son of noted woodwind master, Edward Kidd Jordan, and older brother to Marlon Jordan, another CBS recording artist. Kent Jordan is particularly adept at playing the piccolo, the smallest (and most difficult) member of the flute family.

Earl Turbinton, Jr. & Trinity are arguably New Orleans' best working contemporary jazz group. Consisting of the leader on alto and soprano, James Singleton on acoustic bass and David Lee on drums, this trio, through hard work and practice, produce a rich and varied sound that is never boring or repetitious. The interplay between the members is at the highest possible level, and Earl Turbinton's huge and lovely tone on the alto saxophone is one of the most beautiful sounds ever heard. Mixing a repertoire of standards, jazz classics and originals, Earl Turbinton & Trinity are sure to surprise those who have not heard them before and to continue to delight those who have. The band can be heard on their debut Rounder recording, "Brother For Life."

will provide information and activities around their Discovery Cart, located in the play area.

BANNERS

celebrating the spirit of the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Festival adorn the Kids' Tent. The banners are made by students of Orleans Parish Schools, under the direction of classroom teachers: Val Lacey, George Washington Elementary School; Jeanette Boult, New Orleans Free School; Carolyn Darby, William D. Children may participate in an art project during the first weekend of the festival this year. Local artists, Richard Thomas, Louise Mouton, Nathan Thomas, and Paula Wright will create Musical Columns, featuring Louisiana performers near four areas: Music Heritage Tent, Uncle Ben's Rice Jazz Tent, Economy Hall, Rhodes/WYLD Gospel Tent.

Gonzales native designer James Schexnaydre will carve with a chain saw a 15-foot-long wooden alligator from an ancient piece of cypress on the grounds during the 10 days of the Festival.

Congo Square

"A cultural and spiritual rejuvenation with a family atmosphere,"

is the way co-producer Khalid Hafiz describes "Congo Square," the African culture-oriented area of the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival. This is the second year of Congo Square and co-producer Vera Warren promises "an even more exciting blend of music, crafts, exhibits and cultural atmosphere."

Khalid Hafiz and Vera Warren operated the Community Book Center which was founded by Vera Warren who is also an educator and storyteller who coordinates displays and special exhibits for conferences, conventions and community groups. Originally from New York, Khalid Hafiz is an independent filmmaker with production credits on "A Gathering Of Old Men," "Crush Groove," and "A Special Friendship."





Congo Square is modeled on and inspired by the gatherings that took place in the early 1800s in an open field where the Municipal Auditorium is today. People of African descent were allowed to sing, dance and make music using their own languages, choreography and musical instruments — in no other place in America was there any similar gathering any time during antebellum America.

This modern Congo Square preserves that legacy with an amazing array of cultural manifestations which include a wide variety of demonstrations designed to help audiences understand the Africanoriented aesthetic values of Congo Square participants.
