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


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
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The Jazzfest has become the best music event in the country and probably in the world. We expect over 300,000 guests and our festival will have a \$60 million economic impact on New Orleans.

New Orleans as a city is proud of being the host to this event and the Board of Directors of the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Foundation, Inc., which gives so freely and willingly of its time to aid Quint Davis and myself, and our staff, in producing this festival, has made an impression on the cultural and economic life of this city that can never be erased.


The success of the NOJH&F is unparalleled in the annals of contemporary music festivals. Without the aid of a major underwriter, but through the cumulative contributions of many sponsors (including Miller Beer, Coca Cola, Folger's/Citrus Hill/Sunny Delight, Mars, Inc., Ray-Ban, WNOE, the Fair Grounds, Continental Airlines, WWL TV4, Gray Line, Kentwood and 10-K, Cox Cable/A&E, WVUE TV8, Rhodes, WDSU TV6, WYLD, and Travel New Orleans), the large paying public that attends the festivals, and the sale of concession items (T-shirts, posters, food, etc.) the festival continues to show a large surplus each year. With this artistic and financial success comes responsibility. Our Board of Directors has demonstrated




great care and concern with administering the funds earned by the festival by seeing that Foundation grants are used in the best possible manner to enhance the cultural ambiance of New Orleans. The Board is to be congratulated for the selfless way it has exercised its position of leadership in our community. My staff and I are especially grateful to them for the way we have been allowed to go about doing our job, which is producing this great musical event.

Back in 1970 when I started the idea of the "New Orleans Jazz Festival and Louisiana Heritage Fair" (that was the original name) with a staff of two, headed by Quint Davis, we dreamed of what the future could be. The reality of dreams come true is something that has profoundly affected the lives of everyone involved. This dream will continue as long as those of us who control this magnificient festival, the Board of Directors and the staff, never lose sight of the ideals upon which the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival was built

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Today's situation is drastically different. The Jazzfest's zydeco line-up has been greatly expanded. Zydeco is now a huge draw at clubs and festivals both around America and overseas. Zydeco artists such as Stanley "Buckwheat" Dural and Terrance Simien now appear on national record labels as well as on Hollywood feature-film soundtracks. Perhaps the surest sign of zydeco's current trendiness is its use in television ads for such unrelated products as cars, clothes and hamburgers.

This is a quantum leap for a genre which is thought to take its name from an adapted pronunciation of the French word for "snapbeans"—"les haricots." There's an old Creole dance tune called "les haricots sont pas sale." This translates "the snap beans aren't salty," and besides being a song title it's an expression for hard times, when money's so tight that you can't even afford to season your food. By the '30s "les haricots" had evolved into a general name for Creole dance music in general. A few decades later it was first written down, with various phonetic spellings, of which "zydeco" was the most common. There are still debates over this spelling's accuracy,

and whether the word has African origins. In any case, "zydeco" is here to stay.

The exposure generated by Jazzfest performances has contributed to today's zydeco fad; so, indirectly, has the Cajun food craze, which spread interest in all things Louisianan. Independent record labels, such as Arhoolie, Rounder and Maison de Soul, have also helped significantly by producing the first zydeco albums. Perhaps the biggest single factor, though, was the prominence of zydeco, Cajun music and New Orleans R&B in 1987's hit movie, "The Big Easy." The result, as Clifton Chenier once observed, is that "people used to hate to see an accordion, but now, man, look at 'em! Everybody's tryin' to grab an accordion—everybody!"

Yes, the accordion — which once had a hopelessly hokey image—had now emerged as a fountainhead of infectious funk. Zydeco bands are also apt to include drums, a bass, an electric guitar or two, and possibly horns, but the squeeze-box is still the dominant instrument. Zydeco's other unusual accoutrement is the rubboard, or frottoir—a corrugated metal vest which is played against the chest with spoons or bottle-openers.

The frottoir is one factor that distinguishes zydeco from Cajun music, which uses a less assertive percussion instrument known as the 'tit fer, or triangle. The terms zydeco and Cajun specify Black and white music, respectively, although there's plenty of overlap and mutual influence between the two. Both zydeco and Cajun music make prominent use of accordions; both are frequently sun in french and partially share a common repertoire; both are intended for dancing, as opposed to detached, passive listening.

Zydeco tends to use heavier, more aggressive rhythms, though, and adds a distinct blues-and-soul tinge to its Afro-Caribbean/French folk roots. Cajun music has an Acadian/French folk-music base, and has been strongly influenced by Anglo-American country music—although it's not just con-

ventional country music sung in French. The fiddles and steel guitars which are often heard in Cajun bands rarely appear in zydeco groups. By the same token, few Cajun bands use horns.

These distinct categories have blurred somewhat in recent years, however. Young, rock-influenced Cajun artists like Wayne Toups have also drawn liberally from zydeco, and dubbed their hybrid music "zyde-Cajun." This doesn't always sit well among Creole musicians. On the other hand, "Buckwheat" Dural, for instance, has a clause in his contracts which forbids his zydeco performances to be billed as "Cajun music." "I'm not knocking anyone else," Dural explains, "I'm just proud of my heritage."

Buckwheat Dural's music typifies the urban zydeco sound, which is drenched in modern blues and soul and features



full, tightly-arranged horn sections. Several other bands performing at this year's Jazzfest work in a similar, contemporary mode: Jude Taylor and the Burning Flames, T. Black and the Zydeco Machine, Warren Caesar and Creole Zydeco Snap, Walter Polite and the Zydeco House Rockers, and C. J. Chenier (Clifton's son), with his Red Hot Louisiana Band. While these are all excellent bands, some listeners at times have difficulty distinguishing their music from mainstream blues and soul. The most ethnic component of their repertoires are the rocking two-step dance tunes, which often feature accordion, drums, and frottoir only.

Such hypnotic dance grooves, some of which never change chords, typify the rural zydeco sound. Horns and complex arrangements are usually absent in bands of this sort, whose songs tend to blur together—but pleasantly so. A wild, off-

beat Afro-Caribbean drumming style is also common in this raw, raucous genre, which will be represented at the '90 Jazzfest by Boozoo Chavis and John Delafose.

Then there's the old-time school as exemplified by fiddler Canray Fontenot and accordionist Alphonse "Bois Sec" Ardoin who work in the rural style known as "la musique Creole," which blends elements of both early zydeco and Cajun music.

Whatever the style, don't just stand there; as Clifton Chenier said, "if you can't dance to zydeco, you can't dance—period."






NEW ORLEANS JAZZ & HERITAGE FOUNDATION:

YEAR ROUND PROGRAMS

For New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival is an internationally renowned event. On the other hand, the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Foundation, Inc.—a non-profit corporation which sponsors the Festival—is virtually unknown, even in its own home town.



Directed by noted saxophonist/educator Edward Kidd Jordan, the after-school school also boasts a stellar board of governors including musicians/educators Danny Barker, Alvin Batiste, Harold Battiste, Germaine Bazzle and Ellis Marsalis. This innovative approach to preparing future generations of New Orleans musicians is underwritten entirely by Foundation funds.

The Foundation's board also recently voted to retain the operating license for the non-profit community radio station WWOZ-FM 90.7. The Jazz & Heritage Foundation has held 'OZ's license for the past three years through a subsidiary called the Friends of WWOZ and contributed \$150,000 to the station's operations.

The renewed commitment for the next three years means the station can continue to broadcast the finest in New Orleans jazz and rhythm & blues, along with zydeco, Cajun, Caribbean, African and other world musics.

Over the years, too, another Foundation program has had a direct impact on the cultural life of New Orleans. It's the Community Grants program, which has re-distributed nearly \$500,000 of Festival revenue to individual performing and plastic artists and to local cultural organizations.

The grants program has enabled scores of groups and professional artists to pursue projects that add to the rich tradition of parading, masking, music making, painting, sculpting, writing, lecturing and acting that New Orleans has been blessed to nurture for more than two centuries.

So, no, the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Foundation, Inc. may never attain the public prominence of its similarly named progeny, the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival, however, that's probably as it should be. For as long as the Foundation is doing its part to help the area's culture flourish, the spotlight should be on the artists and the art forms they create. That, after all, is both the mission and the only reason the Foundation exists.

It's a perfectly understandable situation. The names of the two entities are quite similar. They share a common business address and are linked together legally and programmatically. More importantly, both organizations have embarked on a mission to preserve the rich culture of New Orleans and Louisiana.

But while the Festival carries out its mission in a very public annual celebration that spans two weeks in the spring, the Foundation's work goes on all year long, often without any fanfare and frequently in ways that aren't immediately obvious to the general public.

The New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Foundation was established in 1970 to promote, preserve, perpetuate and encourage the music, arts, culture and heritage indigenous to the New Orleans area.

The organization is governed by a 30-member board of directors culled from a broad cross-section of the metropolitan community. The board meets monthly to discuss and initiate policies and programs aimed at carrying out its mission. In addition, the Foundation has a staff—headed currently by Executive Director Tom Dent—to conduct its day-to-day operations.

Certainly, the Jazz & Heritage Festival is the most successful and profitable of the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Foundation's programs. A glorious celebration showcasing the best in Louisiana's food, music, crafts and joie de vivre, the Festival is one of the world's great parties. It also has an economic impact on the local community estimated to be in excess of \$59 million.

For many years, in fact, the Festival was the Foundation's only significant program. And today, it remains the financial engine that pulls along the car loads of other Foundation activities.

But in addition to ensuring that the Jazz & Heritage Festival upholds its reputation as the premier event of its kind, the Foundation is working behind the scenes with several other programs as vital as the Festival in sustaining the Crescent City's unique cultural heritage.

For example, on March 1 of this year, the most recent of the

NEW AT THE JAZZFEST

Major improvements have been incorporated into the 21st annual New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival.

Last year, a storm blew down the River Tent forcing a relocation of two night concerts. This year not only will there be a stronger tent construction but the new tent is a unique structure. Festival producer Quint Davis says, "I have never seen anything like it." Hand-sewn in Italy, embroidered with stars and planets and filled with tiers of seats, Davis rates it "the best performance tent" in the outdoor entertainment business. Although its capacity is 4,000, the new tent seats the audience in upward sloping tiers arrayed in a tight semicircle around the stage. Additionally, the tent has carpeted aisles and has a stronger structure than any other tent ever used by the festival.

Davis' evaluation is that "the tent is the finest portable seating facility anywhere, a concert venue that is superior to most permanent theaters."

The 1990 River Tent is located behind the New Orleans Convention Center at the foot of Calliope Street with plenty of commercial parking available.

For the first time, the Heritage Fair at the Fair Grounds will utilize the grand stands. All festival parades will start and conclude in front of the grandstands. A music stage will face the grand stand and the interior space will be utilized for exhibits, films, as well as food and craft demonstrations.

Finally, there will be a live national broadcast: "NEW ORLEANS LIVE: From the 1990 New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival." The six hour live broadcast is produced by WGBH Radio Boston in association with radio stations WWNO-FM and WWOZ-FM in New Orleans, WPFW-FM

in Washington, DC, and Murray Street Enterprises in New York City.


Robert Lyons, the broadcast's executive producer, notes "this broadcast will push the traditional limits of radio. Not only will we have wordsmiths describing the food at the festival, we'll record the sounds of those foods being cooked and eaten. People will walk away from this broadcast dancing and hungry."

WGBH Radio Boston station manager, Marita Rivero, who played a key role in developing the project, points out that "this broadcast is a true collaboration between WGBH, its radio partners and members of the New Orleans cultural community. Our production team, which includes many local people as well as out-of-towners, is working like an ensemble company."

A new River Tent, opening up the grandstands at the Fair Grounds, and a live national broadcast—a major series of improvements to the world's greatest musical festival.




B.B. King Etta James & The Roots Band John Hammond Deacon John & The Ivories

The opening night concert starts off with the blues, the root music of African American culture. Our stellar line up includes the internationally acknowledged "King of the Blues," Mr. B.B. King along with his world famous guitar "Lucille." A product of Indianola, Mississippi, B.B. King first made his mark as a disc jockey in Memphis, Tennessee and from there went on to become a top performer on the Chicago and southern blues circuit. His breakthrough recording "That's Why I Sing The Blues" along with many appearances on college campuses and the Johnny Carson, Merv Griffin, Flip Wilson and Ed Sullivan television shows, brought his special message to large audiences of people, many of



whom had never before heard the blues. B.B. King performs constantly and is in demand worldwide. The 21st New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival is proud to have B.B. King as the headline attraction on our opening night.

Raised in Los Angeles, California, *Etta James* is a monument of R&B vocal stylings. Her blues based vocalizings, utilize both gospel and traditional blues elements. Graced with a stunning voice of overwhelming power, Etta James is currently enjoying a major revitalization of her career which began many, many years ago when she recorded "Dance With Me Henry," and a follow-up national hit release, "Tell Mama." Ms. James will be backed



by her own hand picked group of musicians, "The Roots Band."

Also on tonight's investigation of the blues is *John Hammond*. The son of the famed Columbia Records talent scout John Hammond Sr., and a major music producer as well as recording artists, John Hammond developed an early devotion to the music of the South. A long time student who learned from many of the originators of the blues, John Hammond is a leading practitioner of the Mississippi delta blues and the rural country blues styles.

The opening band on tonight's blues extravaganza will be New Orleans' own *Deacon John and The Ivories*. A long time favorite who has been performing for over 30 years, guitarist and vocalist Deacon John brings an intense and unique New Orleans flavor to his blues expressions.



Linda Ronstadt featuring Aaron Neville The Subdudes

Linda Ronstadt is an adventurous vocalist who is unafraid to tackle musical challenges and who also enjoys various styles of music. Her recent efforts include lush ballads with strings, an extremely successful and best-selling exploration of "mariachi" folk music of Mexico. Her latest release, "Cry Like A Rainstorm, Howl Like The Wind," which features legendary New Orleans vocalist Aaron Neville. has garnered a 1990 Grammy award. A twelve song release, "Cry..." features new compositions from some of contemporary pop's most respected songwriters, including Jimmy Webb, Karla Bonoff, and the team of Barry Mann & Cynthia Weill (who along with Tom Snow, wrote the Grammy winning

ballad, "Don't Know Much"). Known as vocalist of amazing vocal technique, Linda Ronstadt works at crafting her vocal work to match the material she is doing. From her successful collaboration with Dolly Parton and Emmy Lou Harris on the "Trio" album, to her current duet with Aaron Neville, Linda Ronstadt has established new standards for pop vocals.

The Subdudes are a New Orleans phenomenon. They started in 1984 when three Louisiana-born musicians, Tommy Malone (guitar and vocals), Steve Amedee (tambourine, percussion, and vocals), and Johnny Ray Allen (bass), and a Colorado native, John Magnie (accordion, keyboards, and vocals), formed a group called "The Continental Drifters," which played what Magnie calls "avant garde rhythm & blues, crazy stuff, really loud music."



But they were also "writing mellower songs," recalls Magnie, "in April of '87, we decided to play our more "subdued" material and that name stuck." The Subdudes are basically an acoustic band built around two acoustic guitars, accordion and tambourine. In September 1987 they moved to Colorado and in the spring of '88 they finished on *Musician* magazine's annual Best Unsigned Band Contest. They are now signed to Atlantic Records and have a debut major label album available.





Pianist Ramsey Lewis is tonight's jazz headliner. A Chicago product who began playing piano at the age of four, Ramsey Lewis, along with bassist Eldee Young and drummer Red Holt, founded the Ramsey Lewis trio in 1955. That group went on to become one of the most influential piano trios of its times. They toured widely, recorded for Chess records, and were among the first jazz groups to chart with a gold record in 1965 when their "The 'In' Crowd" recording hit top 5 as a single and top 3 as an album. Later that same year they had a tit with "Hang On Sloopy." A pianist of remarkable range, Ramsey Lewis has recorded over sixty albums during his thirty plus decades of professional playing. His musical interests include not only jazz, but also classical music and pop. His most recent releases

include a classical music album, "A Classic Encounter," a duet album with pianist Dr. Billy Taylor, "We Meet Again," and a new release, "Urban Renewal," which was produced and arranged by Kevyn Lewis, Ramsey Lewis' son.

The Dirty Dozen Brass Band is New Orleans' most accomplished modern brass band. Consisting of Gregory Davis and Efrem Towns on trumpet, Charles Joseph on trombone, Kevin Harris on tenor saxophone, Roger Lewis on baritone and soprano saxophones, Kirk Joseph on sousaphone, Jenell Marshall on snare drum, and Lionel Batiste on bass drum, The Dirty Dozen Brass Band has completely revitalized the marching brass band tradition. Mixing elements of bebop and contemporary jazz with traditional brass band music, they have produced an exhilarating sound that excites both the feet and the ear. Recently





signed to Columbia Records, their second major recording has just been released and includes guest appearances by major New Orleans musicians Danny Barker and Eddie Bo.

Willie Tee (born Wilson Turbinton) is a New Orleans native who is a master of the keyboards in various styles of music. His career includes hit R&B songs such as "Teasin' You" (which remains popular 20 years later as Carolina Beach music) as well as major sessions as a jazz pianist. As a composer his music is widely admired and his songs have been recorded by groups such as Weather Report. Willie Tee also arranged and served as music director for an important Mardi Gras Indian album by the Wild Magnolias. Currently, Willie Tee, along with his battery of electronic keyboards plus organ and acoustic piano, has perfected a one man show which astounds listeners who can not believe that one individual is able to create the sounds of an orchestra.

Dr. Maurice Martinez, aka Marty Most, is a multi-talented New Orleans native. In the 50s he released an influential volume of poetry, "New Orleans Blues." At that time he also pioneered modern poetry mixed with music. Dr. Martinez went on to become a noted musicologist and filmmaker. His definitive research work and film on the Black Mardi Gras Indian phenomenon is widely respected. On tonight's program he will bring a band that includes New Orleans native, percussionist Vernel Fournier who is best known for his work in 50s and early 60s with Ahmad Jamal, and also internationally respected clarinetist, music educator and New Orleans native, Alvin Batiste.

"Gospel Is Alive!"

"Gospel Is Alive!" has become a much heralded and eagerly anticipated annual event at the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival. The headline



group this year is Walter Hawkins & The Hawkins Family. Gospel music legend Walter Hawkins has assembled a stellar cast of family members and gospel associates and has also recorded this group for Birthright records, a Capitol Records subsidiary. Hawkins describes their new release, "Special Gift," as an album I wanted to do for some time. We hit a balance between traditional and contemporary sounds in gospel. It is a studio rather than a live recording because I felt it was important to make a statement demonstrating our production skills and unlimited creativity rather than be confined to the choir idiom. Joining Walter Hawkins will be his younger sister Lynette Hawkins Stephens, solo recording artist Shirley Miller, two other sisters Carol and Feddie Hawkins, and his famous brother Edwin ("Oh Happy Day") Hawkins, who also records on Birthright.

The Mighty Clouds Of Joy are one of the major gospel vocal groups. This Grammy winning group has been performing for over 25 years and have influenced countless male gospel groups. Covering the gamut of gospel styles from traditional four part harmony to contemporary pop-influenced gospel, The Mighty Clouds Of Joy consists of founder Joe Ligon, co-lead singer Johnny Martin, bass singer Richard Wallace, baritone Elmo Franklin, and the newest member, Paul Beasley.

Bobby Jones & New Life is a contemporary gospel group which has made a national impact with their full orchestrations of gospel music mixed with contemporary elements. Grammy winner Bobby Jones is nationally renowned as the host of the weekly "Bobby Jones Gospel" showcase on cable's Black Entertainment Network. This is their first appearance in New Orleans.

NOCCA graduate *Raymond Myles* is considered by most knowledgeable people as New Orleans' major gospel artist. A dynamic vocalist, keyboardist, composer, arranger and choir director, Raymond Myles, has recorded and toured. His mother, *Christine Myles*, a well known New Orleans gospel artist, will appear as a special guest.





group in 1963. By 1967 he was leading his own group when he discovered Pat Metheny at the Wichita Jazz Festival. Burton recalls, "He was one of those rare players who, you could tell immediately, was going to make it big." Today guitarist and composer Pat Metheny is one of the biggest names on the music scene. The New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival is proud to present a reunion of these two great musicians supported by a stellar line-up of professionals.

1990 Grammy winner Chick Corea brings his Elektric Band (Dave Weckl on drums, John Patitucci on bass. Frank Gambale on guitar, Eric Marienthal on saxes) to the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival. Anthony Armado "Chick" Corea was born in Chelsea, Massachusetts on June 11, 1941, and began playing piano at the age of four. Well known for his work with Miles Davis, Chick Corea has been a consistent force at the forefront of bridging the gap between electric-fusion oriented music and acoustic more straight-ahead jazz.

Trombonist and stellar record producer Delfeayo Marsalis heads up a band of hard swinging, young, contemporary jazz musicians. The New Orleans musicians working Marsalis are saxophonist Donald Harrison and trumpeter Marlon Jordan (whose debut album on the Columbia label was released in March 1990). Also included in the band are Cyrus Chestnut (formerly of the Blanchard/Harrison quintet), Charnett Moffett (formerly with Wynton Marsalis), and drummer Ralph Peterson (of Out of The Blue fame).





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

Consisting of Art, Aaron, Charles and Cyril, this family band covers the waterfront of New Orleans music. Keyboard specialist Art Neville is also one of the founders of the Meters and the creator of a quintessential Mardi Gras song, "Mardi Gras Mambo." Vocalist Aaron Neville is arguably the best voice in contemporary music, his influence stretches from his 1967

national charting single, "Tell It Like It Is," to his 1990 Grammy winning duet with Linda Ronstadt, Saxophonist Charles Neville is the major instrumental voice in the group. It was his lead work which was featured on "Healing Chant," the selection which won a Grammy for instrumental by a group. Percussionist and songwriter Cyril Neville has emerged as a major composer both for The Neville Brothers and for his own group. The music of The Neville Brothers accurately expresses the multi-cultural and unique musical gumbo that the world knows and admires as New Orleans music.

Ladysmith Black Mambazo is a South African a cappella group led by founder and spokes person, Joseph Shabalala. The group received international exposure when they recorded and toured with Paul Simon's 1987 Graceland. They have recorded 27 albums, the most recent of which, "Journey Of Dreams," is a major label effort on Warner Brothers.

Rounding out tonight's world music extravaganza is the hottest of the hot Caribbean soca (a mixture of soul and calypso music) vocalists, *Arrow.* Loved and admired for his energetic performances, the creator of "Hot, Hot, Hot" will give concert goers a taste of the spicy rhythms and vocal pyrotechnics from the island worlds of sea, sand, sun and great music.

Ornette Coleman & Prime Time Tribute to Albert Ayler featuring Dewey Redman, Sunny Murray, Frank Wright, Edward "Kidd" Jordan, Elton Herron

Ornette Coleman is one of the most important living musicians in any genre. In 1959 he introduced an innovative, blues-based jazz language for improvisers. His unique (and controversial) harmonic conceptions and



unorthodox line lengths led to a major re-evaluation of the music. His national breakthrough was accomplished with a piano-less quartet, and the majority of us subsequent recordings have been sans piano. Ornette Coleman developed his own musical language and philosophy, "harmolodic." Formerly working with all acoustic instruments, after the rise of fusion, Ornette Coleman introduced the work to his Prime Time Orchestra, a two drums, two basses, two guitars, plus the leader, group which redefined the possibilities of "fusion." He has been both hailed and condemned for his musical achievements. The New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival is proud to close out the 21st annual festival by presenting this visionary and major force in musical culture.

A special "Tribute To Albert Ayler"

master and musical educator Edward Kidd Iordan. Co-founder/leader of the Improvisational Arts Quintet, Kidd Jordan is New Orleans' resident avant gardist. Sharing the saxophone spotlight will be Frank Wright and Dewey Redman. Frank Wright, a native of Grenada, Mississippi, has spent the majority of his jazz playing years in Europe with infrequent gigs in the United States. A tenor saxophonist of rowdy sound and huge tone, Frank Wright personifies the combination of raw blues with high energy free jazz. Texas born Dewey Redman is the leading saxophone graduate of "(Ornette) Coleman University." Admired for his incorporation of blues shouting (literally) and a gritty tenor sound that is mesmerizing, Dewey Redman has both the stamina and intelligence to bring new insights into a vigorous and fast moving improvised musical context. The rhythm section will be anchored by Sunny Murray, the archtypical free jazz drummer. Through his long associations with both the legendary Albert Ayler and Cecil Taylor, Sunny Murray significantly changed the conception of jazz drumming. Rather than a time keeper, he is widely admired as a time free-er, a drum whose innovative use of the drum kit and percussive sounds, opens up new avenues for jazz expression without loosing nor neglecting the essential unity of rhythm-anchored improvisation.

The "African Market Place" Congo Square seeks to re-sensitize fair goers to African culture and heritage through music, dance, arts, crafts, and historical exhibits. This year our theme will focus on an "Ancestral Revival," reclaiming the greatness of African Ancestry, the developers of human civilization. There will be a special focus on "The New Age of Black Art," as well as the exciting and entertaining performances featured on the Congo Square Stage.
