

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

I have been involved in jazz since the late 1930s when I was in my early teens. My original idols are still my idols—Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, Benny Goodman, Art Tatum, and so forth, who were the giants of the Swing era. At one time I was so emotionally involved with these artists that I felt that when Duke and Louis and so many other artists died, it would be the end of my association with jazz.

Of course, life is not like that. Thank heavens! As the years went by, new elements of this great music became part of my life. Dizzy Gillespie, Charlie Parker, Thelonious Monk, Miles Davis and others, each made their own contributions. The beat never stopped—it continues now. There are new faces, new figures and new ideas that keep coming along.

Among these new faces with fresh ideas are a few names that are in large part responsible for an increased interest in jazz an interest on such a large scale as to be worthy of being called a "Jazz Renaissance." Two of those names are Connick and Marsalis. Harry Connick Jr., Branford and Wynton Marsalis have been a part of Jazz Fest since they were youngsters. We welcome you to savor the delights of our music, to enjoy our rich heritage of ethnic crafts, to experience our world-famous, soul-filled cuisine.



New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Foundation Executive Director, Wali Abdel Ra'oof wants a permanent place in New Orleans for tourists and natives alike to participate in the indigenous culture as it is offered at the annual Jazz Festival. "Some place like the zoo or the aquarium where people can go all year long," he said.

Ra'oof thinks the Foundation is just the group to do it. "We've been putting on the festival all these years, we have a good group of people who know how to do it. I see the foundation now as being in a similar position as Audubon Park before the Commission turned the zoo into a national showcase—a transformation which allowed them to spearhead efforts to build the aquarium."

Ra'oof feels the city's culture is "real hot," but not yet in a position to truly take off. He thinks New Orleans (so noted for its historical role in the development of jazz) should have a significant jazz presence that would equal the presence of country music at the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville, Tennessee.

Toward this end, Ra'oof is meeting with other arts and culture groups in the city. "It would be nice if the facility could be in the Treme area, which would make Armstrong Park a likely home," he added.

The new Foundation Director also thinks that a riverfront site would work.

While Ra'oof has definite visions for the future, he is firmly grounded in the present and current programs initiated and supported by the Foundation. The Heritage School of Music, run by Edward "Kidd" Jordan at Southern University of New Orleans, is one example of the innovative line of thought taken up by the Foundation in recent years. Ra'oof thinks the school is more than meeting its original objective of providing a resource for underprivileged children in fifth and sixth grades to access the music by learning to play. "With a Board of Directors which has Kidd Jordan, Harold Batiste, Germaine Bazzle, Ellis Marsalis and Danny Barker, how could they go wrong?"

Students are not just getting the music but some notion of a continuum because of the types of instructor available to them. A sense of place and identity helps to preserve the indigenous music as well. Students are kept in the system until ninth grade, when they can qualify for the New Orleans Center for Creative Arts (NOCCA).

Separate vocal and instrumental classes are planned with theory constituting a large portion of each. The school is currently funded solely by the Foundation.

Edward Kidd Jordan, Heritage School Director, says the fundamentals are essential: "You can't do anything in music unless you know the technical stuff." He also says, although the students are clearly beginners, he is hoping that at least one of them will have a genuine spark of innovation.






"Someone who changes, the music, really takes it someplace else like Louis Armstrong, Charlie Parker or John Coltrane, only comes every 10 or 20 years. But in order to achieve that height of innovation, the person has to have the fundamentals, creativity and instinct, as well as that intuitive sense which helps the person take never heard before creative leaps."

Another major undertaking for the Foundation is the radio station WWOZ. Under a new manager, Willey Rollins, the station promises to claim its rightful place as "the one true alternative radio station" in the city broadcasting the jazz and heritage of New Orleans. WWOZ's strong community base is one of its best assets. The foundation is looking forward to WWOZ's growth in the future.

Ra'oof says other programs and projects sponsored by the foundation will go on. He is making plans for this year's lecture series, community outreach ticket program and quarterly newsletter. Ra'oof indicates that the grant program, as always, will depend on the success of the festival. Last year there were no grants awarded because of the financial commitment to the Heritage School and radio station WWOZ.

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





Wynton Marsalis, subject of a *Time* magazine cover story and the winner of eight Grammy Awards, is widely regarded as this era's leading young jazz musician. Marsalis' recent CBS recordings ("Majesty Of The Blues" and soundtrack to "Tune In Tomorrow") delve into the roots and history of jazz as he presents compositions which reflect the blues, plus the influences of Duke Ellington, Jelly Roll Morton, and other historic figures. Joining Mr. Marsalis for this Armstrong tribute will be veteran trumpeters **Doc Cheatham and Ruby Braff**. Also on the program are New Orleans greats: banjoist, guitarist, bandleader, vocalist, and composer **Danny Barker**; pianist and composer **Ellis Marsalis** (who also happens to be both the literal and musical father of Wynton Marsalis whom he taught in high school at NOCCA); clarinetist and jazz historian, **Dr. Michael White** who has recorded with Wynton Marsalis and who also has a new album "Crescent City Serenade" on the Mango/Antilles label. Rounding out the cast are New Orleans musicians: trumpeter **Teddy Riley**, cornetist **Greg Stafford**, trombonist **Freddy Lonzo**, trumpeter **Nicholas Payton**, vocalist **Thais Clarke**. The night will be hosted by television journalist **Ed Bradley**.

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



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MILES DAVIS B.B. KING ROCKIN' DOPSIE & The Zydeco Twisters



This is a night of old and new variations and extensions of the blues by master musicians who are internationally acknowledged as kings in their respective genres. Jazz and pop trumpeter **Miles Davis** is the most legendary living jazz figure. Miles Davis' recent published autobiography was a spectacular media event. As a bandleader the list of his alumni reads like a who's who of contemporary jazz. His trumpet stylings are not only widely admired and emulated. He is also the initiator of major stylist developments (e.g. hard bop, cool and fusion) within jazz. A charismatic individual who has carved his own idiosyncratic niche in the cultural world of America, he never fails to attract attention and admiration for his highly personal musical presentations.

Hailing from Indianola, Mississippi is the worldwideacknowledged king of the blues, **B.B. King.** B.B. King, along with his guitar Lucille (his constant companion and soul-mate), will once again work his blues magic at the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival. King is a seemingly tireless ambassador of the blues who not only performs over 200 nights a year, but also finds time to lecture on college campuses, to make TV and movie appearances, and perform humitarian concerts for benefits and in prisons, while simultaneously continuing to produce award-winning recordings. While King is a consumate entertainer, he is also one of the most distinctive electric blues guitarist in the world. His instantly identifiable sound has influenced more than three generations of blues artists. His current album "Live At San Quentin" (MCA) is a 1991 Grammy-award winning release.

Rounding out this night will be **Rockin' Dopsie** and The Zydeco Twisters. Born Alton Jay Rubin in Carencro, LA in 1932, Rockin' Dopsie is the heir apparent to the King of zydeco throne which was left empty by the passing of Clifton Chenier. Accordionist and vocalist Rockin' Dopsie offers a captivating variation of blues elements in a zydeco setting offer bilingual blues howls augmented by some of the funkiest accordion music ever played on the planet earth.







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

"THE SQUARE"

The first Congo Square commemorative poster, is a visual, cultural and historical overview of the ancestry of Congo Square. It was designed by local artist John T. Scott. "THE SQUARE" represents a bright spot in the memory of Woman as mother and goddess of the matriarchal system from' which the family evolved. It portrays the "Bamboula", an African dance, as the birth of Jazz - the origin of the second line. The poster was produced as a joint venture between Planet Publishing and MAGCO. The 8-color silkscreen poster is printed in an edition of 2.000. Of that number, 500 are signed and numbered by the artist and is available for \$75. Pianist, vocalist and entertainer Harry Connick Jr. is a New Orleans native, graduate of NOCCA (yes, he was an Ellis Marsalis student) and 1991 Grammy award winner. The son of the city's district attorney and former record store owner, Harry Connick Jr. was a child prodigy who played in French Quarter nightclubs while in his early teens. Today he plays the major concert halls and supper clubs of the world. Equally comfortable in a solo, trio or big band setting, Harry Connick Jr. is currently delighting and capturing the hearts of American audiences with a full orchestra tour during which he offers both his own compositions (some of them co-written with bassist Ramsey McLean) as well as his unique interpretations of show tunes and standards from the '40s and '50s.

Harry Connick Jr. will perform two SRO shows, each of which will be a full review, rather than the brief 45-minute sets which are the norm for many young artists. A magnetic and appealing personality, Harry Connick Jr. has branched out into movie scoring as well as movie acting, and can be heard in a featured song from The Godfather III in addition to his own albums on CBS.

Evangelist Shirley Caesar is a modern day phenomenon. As a performer, she is holds five Grammy Awards, three gold albums, six Dove Awards, and her recording "Live In Chicago" held the number spot for over 50 weeks. Ms. Shirley Caesar is also a pastor, business woman and elected member of Durham, North Carolina's City Council.

Born and reared in Durham, NC, she began her career as a child gospel artist performing as "Baby Shirley Caesar." Since that beginning she has gone on to become one of the most active, most acclaimed and best-loved gospel artists in history. Additionally, Evangelist Shirley Caesar is an active humanitarian in the true spirit of Christianity. She operates the Shirley Caesar Outreach Ministries, Inc., a non-profit organization, which provides emergency funds, food, clothing and shelter for the underprivileged and the needy, plus produces radio broadcasts, revivals, crusades and evangelistical meetings.

In the midst of all of this activity, this phenomenal individual continues to spread the word of God through the use of her own unique talents as a gospel artist.

Vocalist Tramaine Hawkins has been singing for over 20 years. She was born in San Francisco and



raised in Berkeley. Her mother, Lois Davis, is a gospel singer and her grandfather, Bishop E.E. Cleveland, Pastor of Ephesians Church of God in Christ, is one of the East Bay's most respected clergymen. At the age of 10, Tramaine Hawkins recorded her first sinale, "He's All Right," with the Heavenly Tones produced by the legendary Rev. James Cleveland. Her latest recording and full-length concert video is "Tramaine Hawkins Live!"

The Williams Brothers were organized in 1960 by Leon "Pop" Williams who is the founder and father. Initially they were known as "The Little Williams Brothers," later the name was changed to "The Sen-sational Williams Brothers," and today are simply but internationally known as "The Williams Brothers." Hailing from Smithdale, Mississippi, the group began recording in 1973 and have had numerous hits on the gospel charts such as "Jesus Will Never Say No," "I Won't Let Go My Faith," and their widely imitated, "I'm Just A Nobody."

Rounding out the gospel program is New Orleans' own St. Francis DeSales Golden Voice Choir under the direction of Lois Dejean.





This special concert highlights traditional jazz of New Orleans and pays tribute to some of its major stalwarts: clarinetist Willie Humphrey, trumpeters Percy Humphrey and George "Kid Sheik" Colar, saxophonist Harold "Duke" Dejean, trombonist Waldren "Frog" Joseph, and the late clarinetist George Lewis.

The night will open with appearances by a band of young New Orleans musicians who are carrying on the jazz tradition, **Next Generation Jazz Band:** Wendell Brunious, trumpet and leader; Don Vappie, banjo; Michael White, Clarinet; Freddie Lonzo, trombone; Joseph Lastie, drums; Thaddeus Richard, piano; Chris Severin, bass.

The program will continue with the stirring sounds of a specially assembled **All-Star Brass Band:** Placide Adams, snare drum and leader (from Onward Brass Band); Nowell Glass, bass drum (from Dejan's Olympia Brass Band); Milton Batiste, trumpet (from Dejan's Olympia Brass Band); Gregory Stafford, trumpet (from Young Tuxedo Brass Band); Wendell Eugene, trombone (from Young Tuxedo Brass Band); Ralph Johnson, clarinet (from Onward Brass Band); Ernest Watson, tenor sax (from Dejan's Olympia Brass Band); Edgar Smith, bass horn (from Dejan's Olympia Brass Band); Maynard Chatters, trombone (from Onward Brass Band); and Clyde Kerr Jr., trumpet (from Onward Brass Band).

The Local International All-Stars under the leadership of John "Kid" Simmons reflects the influence New Orleans traditional jazz music and musicians had worldwide. The countries represented by the members of this band include England, Canada, Germany and New Zealand. The members are John "Kid" Simmons on trumpet, Chris Burke on clarinet, Frank Naundorf on trombone, Ron Simpson on banjo, Maggie Kinson on piano, Paul Henderson on bass, and Andrew Hall on drums.

The honored band is a mainstay at Preservation Hall, Percy Humphrey's Crescent City Joymakers. This band is a purveyor of the authentic style of traditional New Orleans jazz as it was played years and years ago. The band members are Narvin Kimball, banjo; James Prevost, bass; Frank Demond, trombone; Joseph Lastie, drums; Phamous Lambert, piano; Manuel Crusto, clarinet; and Percy Humphrey trumpet and leader.

For the dozen or so years bracketing the 1950s, New Orleans experienced a "Golden Age of Rhythm & Blues." This was the era when local heroes like Fats Domino and Lloyd Price leapt into stardom, and their success prompted national R&B stars to record in New Orleans employing local musicians. The hope was that the New Orleans sound would provide a sure-fire success formula, and this was quickly proven true by the likes of Little Richard and Big Joe Turner.

The '50s were also a Golden Age in the sense that New Orleans Rhythm & Blues experienced a creative surge, as demonstrated by the emergence of such greats as Smiley Lewis, Lee Dorsey, Dave Bartholomew, and many, many others.

In the midst of that exciting epoch, though, the most creative and prolific artist was pianist, songwriter, and producer/arranger Allen Toussaint who was a regular at the Dew Drop Inn—a place where live New Orleans Rhythm & Blues evolved, expanded and redefined itself. The Dew Drop Inn was the most jumping joint in town. Although the Dew Drop held its last show in 1969, Allen Toussaint

is still working and creating in as fine a form as ever. The 1991 Jazz Fest will honor both of these R&B institutions with a Wednesday, May Ist concert entitled "Dew Drop Inn Revisited: The Toussaint Legacy." Featuring Irma Thomas, Art Neville, Ernie K-Doe, Jesse Hill, Earl King and Chick Carbo, this will truly be an all-star revue. Opened in 1942 by Frank Painia, the Dew Drop Inn was not only New Orleans' leading R&B nightclub, but "a subculture within a subculture," as Charles Neville recalls. "In the Black community this was the only place where neople who had tramendous creative things hannening.

place where people who had tremendous creative things happening could get to display their stuff."

Hand-painted murals graced the walls of the club. Frank Painia's R&B booking policy also included dance, comedy, variety acts, and female impersonators. A loyal patron of the arts, Painia housed and fed many musicians, and nurtured their budding careers.

Allen Toussaint paid his dues as a member of the Dew Drop Inn's house band. But it was at Cosimo Matassa's legendary recording studio that Toussaint truly distinguished himself—as both an agile pianist, and an intuitive producer who could quickly craft hits from rough ideas and raw talent. Toussaint went on to crown these skills with a brilliant flair for song-writing. Internationally renowned today, he has written a wealth of New Orleans classics, many of which helped launch the careers of this concert's headliners.

Irma Thomas, "The Soul Queen of New Orleans," scored a smash with Toussaint's "It's Rainin" which remains a perennial hometown classic-just as Thomas remains a perennial favorite for both her fine singing and high civic profile.

Years before he teamed up with his illustrious brothers, Art Neville sparked countless slow-dance romances with his soulful rendition of Toussaint's "All These Things."

Ernie K-Doe, best known lately for his local-radio ravings, enjoyed his greatest success with Toussaint pithy "Mother-In-Law."

Earl King, whose numerous songwriting credits include "Trick Bag" and "Big Chief" was a a Dew Drop Inn regular, and the funky showmanship

that he mastered there remains riveting today. Jessie Hill's biggest hit, "Ooh Poo Pah Do," was produced by Toussaint; its wild call-and-response beginning always gets crowds fired up.

A contrastingly cool, polished approach elicits a similar response for Chick Carbo just like in the old days, when Carbo sang with the Spiders on hits such as "You're The One." The Spiders are long gone, but the spirit of their era will rise again when "Dew Drop Revisited: The Toussaint Legacy" honors the Golden Age of New Orleans Rhythm & Blues.

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



The Robert Cray Band represents the most popular reemergence of the blues in the last decade. Born in Georgia, but raised all across America because his father was in the armed services, Robert Cray paid his blues dues while based in Tacoma, Washington. Displaying a vocal style whose hallmark is smooth sincerity and a guitar style which is both a composite of previous blues guitarists but also a unique personal statement. Robert Cray's consistency as a performer is based in part on his compositional abilities which are widely admired. While most contemporary blues artists are content to "cover" blues classics or to create allegedly "new" songs which are really often nothing but reworkings of previously recorded material, Robert Cray to his credit has been extending the blues tradition. Tonight he will be joined by the Memphis Horns, who are also featured on his latest album.

Born August 22, 1917, in Clarksdale, Mississippi, John Lee Hooker is truly not only a legendary blues artist, he is a founding father of modern blues. His

work and influence began with the post-WWII era and extends into the '90s. A folk artist of deceptive starkness in his chording, his work is thick with uniquely patterned rhythm lines which are sounded out in sometimes unorthodox harmonies while "The Hook" (as he is affectionately known) vocalizes his tales of both hard times and high times in a semi-hoarse blues voice. From his early work with the Newport Folk Festival where he deeply affected a generation of American folk singers, on to his influence on English artists (especially John Mayall) and influence on contemporary white blues artists (Bonnie Raitt, Canned Heat, and many others), John Lee Hooker has shaped the styles of countless practitioners of the blues.

Opening tonight's program are The Radiators who will present New Orleans own unique contribution to blues-based popular music, a form they call "Fishhead" music. The band is lead by keyboardist and vocalist Ed Volker.





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

The uniqueness of "new world" Afro-centric rhythmetic conceptions will be featured in this night of New Orleans, Jamaican and Brazilian music. **The Neville Brothers** (Art, Aaron, Charles and Cyril) represent the quintessential New Orleans style of contemporary popular music. Grammy award winners, they are capable of combining traditional New Orleans street rhythms, songs and chants, with seminal '50s New Orleans R&B, as well as contemporary social commentary, all mixed into an intoxicating musical brew which is virtually unmatched in its potency. In recent years their career has taken off with a Grammy-winning release, "Yellow Moon" (A&M) with a multifaceted album called "Brother's Keeper" (A&M).

Toots And The Maytals are one of the oldest and most durable reggae aggregations on the planet. A virtual compendium of reggae music, matched in popularity and influence by only two other living reggae artists (Burning Spear and Jimmy Cliff), Toots is credited with coining the usage of the word "reggae" to refer a style of music when he recorded a song whose lyrics included "do the reggae." In recent years Toots has recorded in Memphis featuring his interpretation of classic soul music, however, his major contribution is as a roots reggae artist who retains and celebrates the basic elements.

Milton Nascimento is Brazil's leading vocalist and songwriter. He possesses one of the world's most ethereal voices which effortlessly rises on an airy falsetto to sublime realms. Milton Nascimento's voice is surpassed only by his songwriting skills which range from snapshots of Brazilian reality to political anthems and philosophical statements. Many of his songs are considered classics of Brazilian music and are widely known, performed and emulated not only in Brazil but throughout the western hemisphere. His music has profoundly influenced a wide variety of artists who have covered his songs as well as recorded with him. Fans of Milton Nascimento include pop artist Paul Simon, jazz instrumentalists Wayne Shorter and Pat Metheny, as well as numerous vocalists including Sarah Vaughn. Unlike many other "sensitive" artists who can create amazing statements in the studio but who are unable to duplicate their artistry in person, Milton Nascimento is noted for his amazing in person performances. His latest release, Taxi (CBS) is an album which focuses on the destruction of Brazil's rainforests and cultures. He is the honorary president of the Brazilian rainforest protection organization, The Alliance of the People of the Forest.

COUNTRY MUSIC **AT THE '91** JAZZ FEST

Louisiana is best known for its vital contributions to African American and Afro-Caribbean music, including jazz, blues, R&B, gospel and zydeco. But there's also a rich country music heritage here up in Shreveport.

The old Louisiana Hayride helped launch the likes of Elvis Presley and Hank Williams, while a contemporary, late-night New Orleans broadcast (WWL's "The Road Gang") provided one of America's best venues for classic country music, corny comedy, and truckers' folklore.

A wide range of country styles flourishes today both in Louisiana, in general, and at this year's Jazz Fest, in particular.

One of country's most important folk sources is medieval British ballads. This all-but-vanished genre is still performed by Brownie Ford, the singing cowboy from Caldwell Parish. Ford, a seasoned rodeo rider and bucking-bronco breaker, also plays Western material, and '50s honky-tonk tunes. At age 87, his debut album was just released this year.

When commercial recording began in the '20s and '30s, country had evolved into a variety of styles including old-timey and string band music, both of which are themselves eclectic mixtures.

Several fine festival bands work in this acoustic-oriented vein: Firstly, the Grey Eagle String Band, from the heart of North Louisiana's Anglo cultural region, is highlighted by the swinging finesse of fiddler Fred Beavers.

Secondly, guitarist Troy Deramus leads an Alexandria-based band known as Hill Country, playing string band tunes and honky-tonk songs; he also organizes the annual state fiddling championship contest, and is quite a witty MC.

Lastly, two excellent traditional bands are based in New Orleans: Hazel and the Delta Ramblers, and the Evening Star String Band, featuring singing guitarist Pat Flory and dobro ace Harold Cavallero.

One of country's pretty, poignant styles is close-harmony duet singing. Duos such as the Blue Sky Boys and the Louvin Brothers forged this format in an unadorned country vein, while the Everly Brothers brought in pop and rock material and became a major influence on the Beatles.

In either case, close harmony is usually associated with Appalachiabut Louisiana is home to one of its best young duos, the Whitstein Brothers, from Pineville.


The '40s and '50s saw the rise of honky-tonk and hillbilly boogie, which will be represented by Gray Montgomery of Vidalia. Montgomery is a soulful crooner and hot guitarist who accompanies himself by "stomping" a foot-pedal bass. Back in the early '50s Montgomery toured with "pop the whip" artist Lash LaRue, and once hired a fledgling drummer named Jerry Lee Lewis.

Country's on-going popularity is emphasized by such New Orleans Top 40 bands as Mississippi South, Russ Russell and the Rustlers, who play a current/classic mixture. Tay Hogg and Dixie Pride perform an all-original repertoire.

In the related field of Cajun music, the Hackberry Ramblers play both Cajun material and Western Swing; the band has been together continuously since 1933, and still features its founders, fiddler Luderin Darbone and guitarist Edwin Duhon.

Finally, the Jazz Fest's '91 country line-up features two special outof-state guests: Texas songwriter Butch Hancock, the pride of both Austin and Lubbock, and progressive writer, producer and singer Rodney Crowell, who maintains a strong local connection through original songs like "Leavin' Louisiana In The Broad Daylight."

In addition Hancock, Crowell, and Brownie Ford will appear together at a workshop on the Music Heritage Stage where they will share their insights and experiences vis-a-vis country music.
