This Festival marks the beginning of a wonderful season (spring and summer actually) of music festivals across the country and around the world, many of which I am proud to be associated with, such as the JVC JAZZ Festivals in New York and Newport, the Playboy Jazz Festival at the Hollywood Bowl, Ben & Jerry's Newport Folk Festival, Philadelphia's Jambalaya Jam (a mini version of the New Orleans event) and many others.

Continental Airlines is the Official Airline of these festivals and is helping us get the word out at a special information line (800/468-7022, code #EZZMS19).

As usual the word is already out about the event at hand, with Quint Davis and the New Orleans staff, the members of the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Foundation Board of Directors, and many community volunteers working to bring about what could be America's most talked-about music festival. 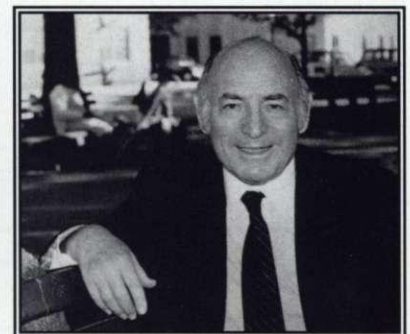

the heritage school of music. A music school dedicated to the education of aspiring young musicians in the

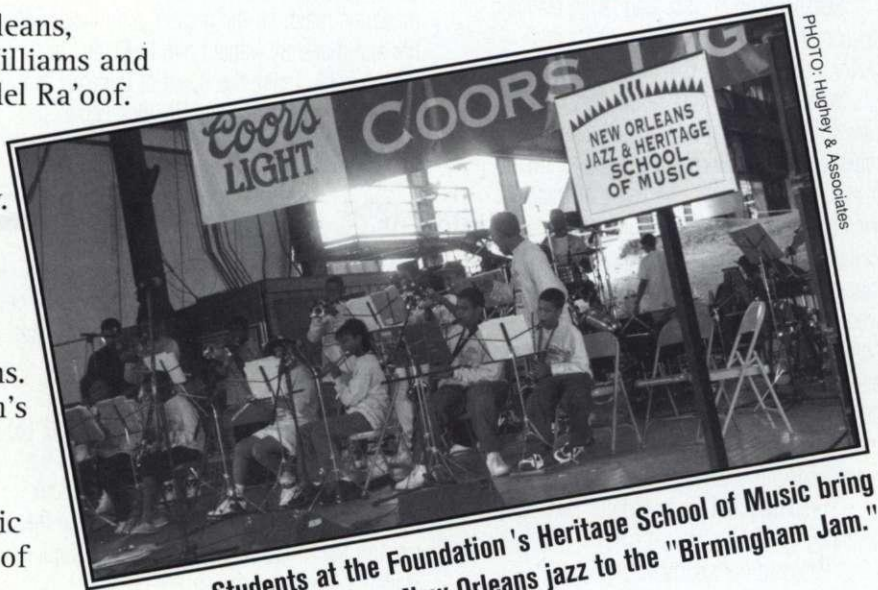

Greater New Orleans area. The Heritage School of Music is under the direction of Edward "Kidd" Jordan. The board of directors is Ellis Marsalis, Harold Battiste, Germaine Bazzle, Alvin Batiste and Danny Barker. The Heritage School of Music was founded in April 1990 and consists of approximately 30 students whose ages range between 10 and 15 years old.

Last fall, the Heritage School of Music band appeared at the Birmingham Jam Festival. This year the Heritage Band will be a headliner on one of the Jazzfest night concerts. "This is just one example of the impact we are having in the community. This young people are performing with some of the all time greats," comments Foundation Executive Director Wali Ra'oof.

WWOZ. Another area of Foundation activity is radio station WWOZ. The Foundation administers the license of WWOZ-90.7 FM radio station. WWOZ is nationally unique in its diverse programming which ranges from contemporary and traditional jazz, to New Orleans music, to a wide variety of ethnic programs including African, Bluegrass, Brazilian and Irish. As part of its ongoing

emphasis on cultural development and cultural diversity, the Foundation underwrites the administrative costs of WWOZ.

Dan Williams proudly notes, "This year WWOZ is sponsoring the jazz tent at the Festival. We have a new station manager, David Friedman, who is doing an excellent job of improving and upgrading the station."

Economic Empowerment. The Foundation is concerned with making an economic impact on the New Orleans community. The Board has established programs to insure that everyone in the community, regardless of race, gender, religion or national origin, will have an opportunity to sit at the economic table of the Jazzfest and get a slice of the economic pie.

This year the Foundation is teaming with Bright Moments, Inc., a New Orleans public relations and marketing firm to produce the Jazzfest posters. "Bright Moments, Inc. brings marketing expertise and management skills and the Foundation offers the economic clout. This is an experiment in economic empowerment that will have a major impact on our community," states Wali Ra'oof.

grants programs. The economic success of the Jazzfest is given back to the community through a grants program. In past years, the Foundation has given over six hundred thousand dollars to musicians, artists, and cultural organizations in the New Orleans metropolitan area. Based on receipts from the Jazzfest, the Foundation usually awards \$100,000 in grants.

street festivals. Beginning with their 1991 Treme Street Festival, The Foundation continues to offer community groups the opportunity to raise money and foster neighborhood activities by participating in a series of neighborhood based street festivals. The latest festival was the Uptown Street Festival held in April on Magazine Street.

music programs. The Foundation sponsors a series of informational and educational workshops, seminars and retreats to address the needs of New Orleans musicians. Everything

THE ALLMAN BROTHERS BAND

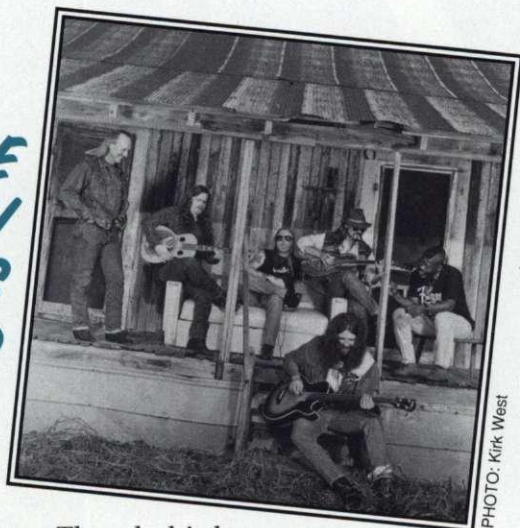
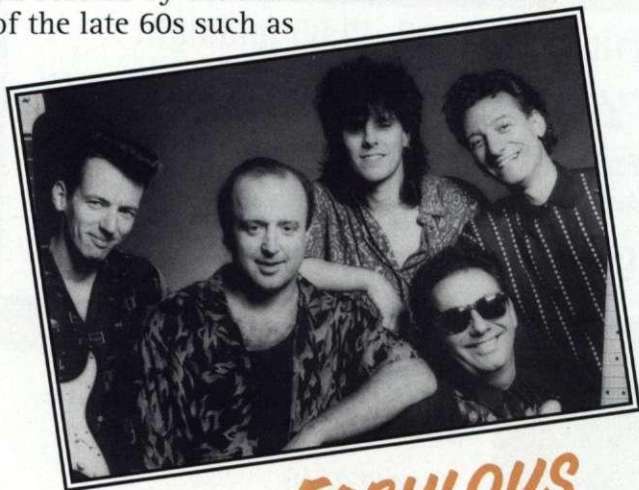

The 24th annual New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival kicks off with a night of deep south contemporary blues. The headliner is popular rock and blues group, The Allman Brothers Band. Their first recording was released in 1969, although founders Duane and Greg Allman had previously recorded in various formations. Duane was a Muscles Shoals, Alabama house guitarists and appears on records by the seminal soul musicians of the late 60s such as

Aretha Franklin, Clarence Carter, and King Curtis. Duane Allman died in a motorcycle accident and the band carried on for almost a decade before breaking up in 1981. In the summer of 1989 a 20th anniversary tour was assembled and the band has continued to work ever since featuring drummer Butch Trucks, guitarist Warren Haynes, keyboardist Gregg Allman, guitarist Dickey Betts, bassist Allen Woody and drummer Jaimoe.

Founded by guitarist Jimmie Vaughan, older brother of Stevie Ray Vaughan,

The Fabulous Thunderbirds were founded in 1975, Texas using Antone's, an Austin, Texas blues joint as their home base, the band toured extensively through the Texas/Louisiana gulf states area. They have gone on to become one of the most durable of the contemporary blues groups.

Guitarist John Campbell is one of the rising stars in the contemporary blues firmament. His story, however, is classic. "When I was about 15 I used to drag race cars and bikes, I got into a real bad accident, and I was real messed up. I lost my right eye and had 5,000 stitches and surgery to hold my face together. I spent a lot of time at home recovering and it was during that time that I met the blues."

Born in Shreveport, Louisiana in 1952, Campbell paid his dues on the streets, in pool halls, and gas stations of Louisiana and Texas before moving to New York where he became a sideman in demand and eventually came to the attention of his current label Elektra Records.

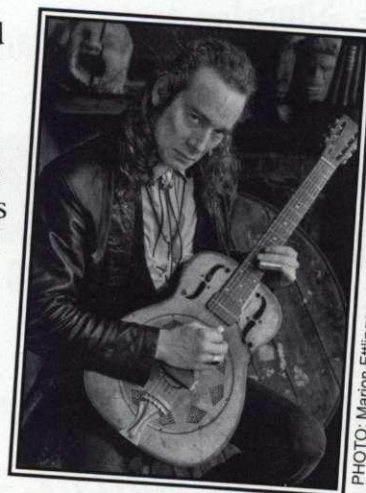
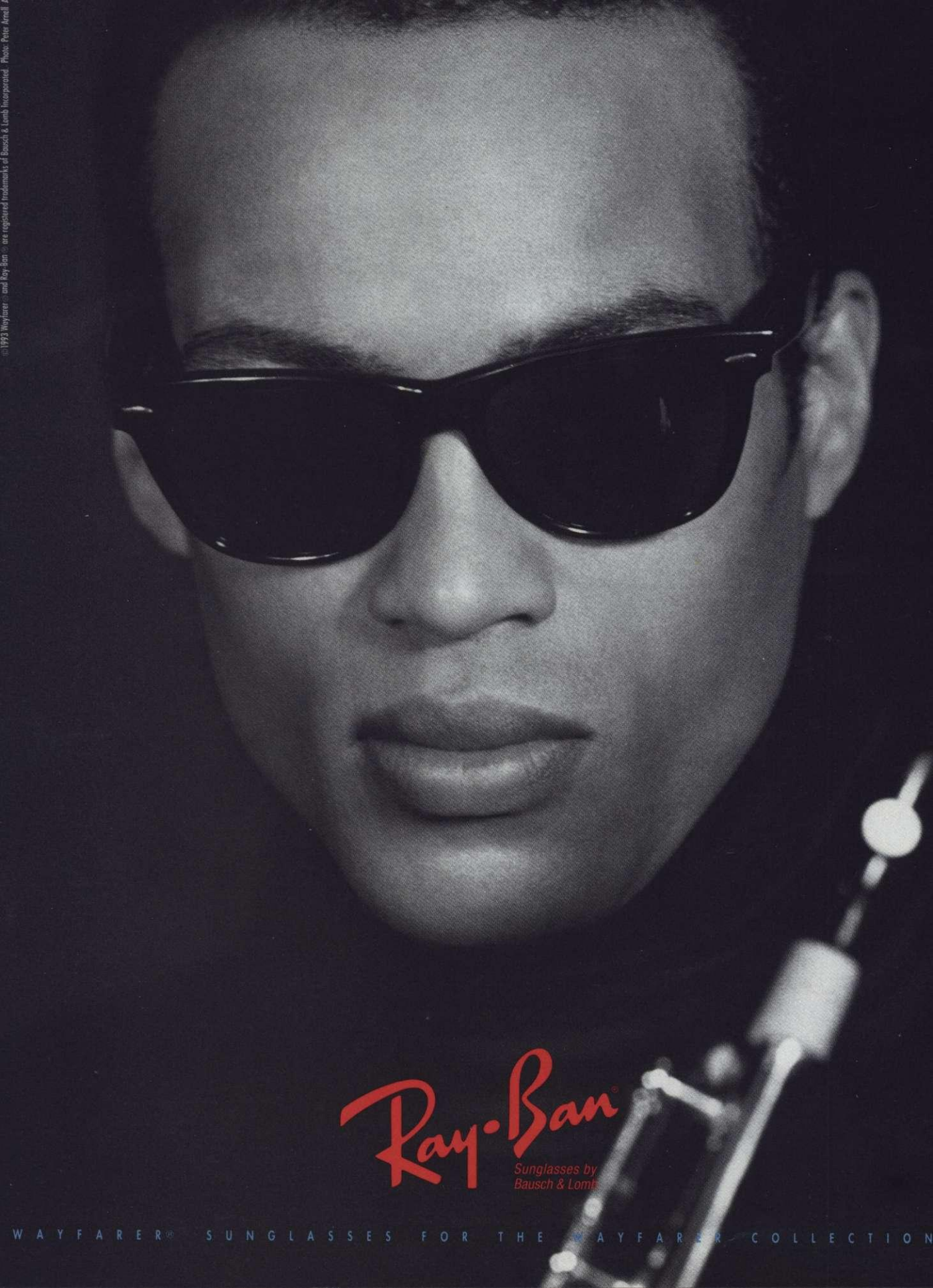

For this year's jazzfest, the original cast is reunited for a joyous encore performance that exemplifies how good it can be "one mo' time."

Clarinetist Dr. Michael White is the leading exponent of traditional jazz among New Orleans' young musicians. An alumnus of bands led by Danny Barker and Doc Paulin, Dr. White doesn't just draw on traditional sources, he plays

in the authentic style. He annually appears at Lincoln Center to demonstrate and perform traditional New Orleans jazz and is one of the main influences on Wynton Marsalis' return to traditional New Orleans jazz for inspiration. Tonight's program is a tribute to Jelly Roll Morton. A similar program won rave reviews when it was performed at Lincoln Center in New York.


Drummer Bob French is the son of legendary New Orleans traditional jazz musician Albert "Papa" French. Heir to one of the finest sit-down (concert) trad bands in the city, Mr. French is an active link in the chain of musicians families for which New Orleans is justifiably famous.

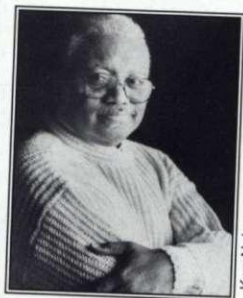
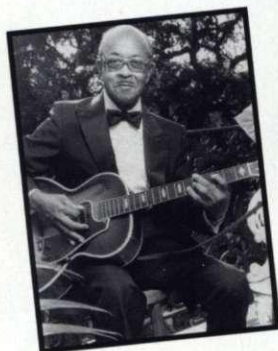

THE NEW ORLEANS JAZZ & HERITAGE FOUNDATION COMMISSIONS ORIGINAL WORKS BY DANNY BARKER, ALVIN BATISTE, HAROLD BATTISTE, GERMAINE BAZZLE, EDWARD "KIDD" JORDAN, ELLIS MARSALIS AND THE HERITAGE SCHOOL OF MUSIC BAND

Saxophonist Grover Washington ably represents both the traditions and contemporary expressions of modern jazz. He is adept as both a straight ahead swinger and a finger popping fusion player. Although he was born and reared in Buffalo, New York, his adopted home is Philadelphia, and his warm sound is synonymous with the swinging and soulful Philly sound. His 1980 "Winelight" release won him two Grammys: one for "Best Jazz Fusion Performance" and one for "Best R&B Song" (a now classic duet with Bill Withers titled "Just The Two Of Us"). Washington has spawned a host of younger saxophonist who attempt to duplicate his warm and smooth saxophone stylings but Grover Washington remains the undisputed master of melodic and sensual saxophone playing.

In an unprecedented move, The New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Foundation has commissioned local artists to present original works. Featured performers are: composer, banjoist, guitarist, vocalist Danny Barker. Mr. Barker was recently inducted into Rutgers

University's Jazz Hall of Fame and is the recipient of an NEA Jazz Masters Award. Clarinetist Alvin Batiste, a former professor of music at Southern University in Baton Rouge, is regarded in jazz circles as a premiere modern jazz clarinetist. Composer, saxophonist, arranger and record executive (he heads the New Orleans based All For One Records), Harold Battiste is a professor in the University of New Orleans Jazz Studies Program. Beloved vocalist and choral teacher Germaine Bazzle is the city's leading jazz vocalist. Creative music woodwind master Edward "Kidd" Jordan is a professor of music at Southern University in New Orleans and the director of The Heritage School of Music Band, a group of young people whose average age is the very early teens. Rounding out the guest artists is pianist Ellis Marsalis, head of UNO Jazz Studies Program and the reigning patriarch of modern jazz as both the literal and figurative father of a host young musicians who have made an indelible and internationally known impact on modern jazz.

The legendary Dew Drop Inn was a New Orleans nightspot that served as an incubator which spawned many of the most well known New Orleans R&B artists. For several years, The New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival’s “Dew Drop Inn Revisited” series has been presenting a concert tribute to the great artists who cut their musical teeth in that historical establishment. This year’s concert is especially noteworthy as it is headlined by Lloyd “Mr. Personality” Price. Price career includes an impressive string of fourteen consecutive Top 10 Hits (including “Just Because,” “Stagger Lee,” “Lawdy Miss Clawdy,” and, his signature composition, “Personality”) which sold in

excess of forty-five million records, an achievement only recently eclipsed by Michael Jackson. Also featured on the program will be Benny Spellman, famous for “Fortune Teller” and “Lipstick Traces”; emerging blues diva Marva Wright; ubiquitous bass player and vocalist George French; and, the recently rediscovered Roland Stone. The wizard of New Orleans musical arrangement Wardell Querzergue will conduct the backing orchestra and the Master of Ceremonies will be Bobby Marchan, a former vocalist with Huey Smith and the Clowns and the most beloved of New Orleans emcees.

This is the roots music night featuring three artists who each exemplify their respective ethnic heritage. The headliner is The Neville Brothers, New Orleans' best known and most beloved contemporary group. Widely hailed for their unique and instantly identifiable New Orleans sound, The Neville Brothers are crucial proponents of New Orleans' street music traditions. With a new release on the way and constant touring, The Neville Brothers stay busy as a group and individually, somehow find time to produce individual projects. Vocalist Aaron Neville has a new solo album forthcoming as a follow up to his smash hit "Warm Your Heart." When not touring with The Neville Brothers, keyboardist Art Neville is actively working with the quintessential New Orleans funk band, The Meters. Saxophonist Charles Neville leads and records an eclectic jazz band known as "Diversity." Vocalist and percussionist Cyrille Neville leads his own band, The Uptown Allstars, and works as a producer for a bevy of emerging New Orleans musicians.

LOS LOBOS



summarizes the Mexican American musical traditions than do Los Lobos. They had a mega-hit with the movie soundtrack recording "La Bamba" but have refused to be defined by or limited to a one song sound. Encompassing the whole of their heritage, their music includes an array of acoustic instruments as well as the standard "two guitars, bass and drums" pop instrumentation. While remaining true to their roots they have also been willing to experiment with innovative song forms as demonstrated on their current release "Kiko."

Rounding out the night will be Terrance Simien & The Mallet Playboys who perform an exuberant and unique style of music known as zydeco. Featuring accordion and frottoir (metal washboard scrapped with spoons or some other metal pick), zydeco comes from Louisiana's bayou country and is usually song entirely or partly in a French patois (French is the official second language of Louisiana). From recording with Paul Simon and touring with Los Lobos to cameo appearances in Hollywood movies, Terrance Simien has been at the forefront

Trumpeter Gardner is a member of the McCoy Tyner Big Band and has been active on the New York scene. Bassist Sharpe and drummer Scott are both active members of the McCoy Tyner Trio and have appeared on a plethora of recent jazz recordings.

After the opening set by these veterans, emerging artists and guests musicians appearing elsewhere on the festival will be invited to join in the musical marathon. This is the best bet to hear the musicians stretch out and really cut loose.

Oh what a night. New Orleans funk, Spanish-tinged rock and African juju music will collide in an orgy of rhythm.

Headlining will be guitarist Santana. Born in Autlan, Mexico and reared in Tiajuana, Santana moved to San Francisco in 1961 and in 1966 debuted the Santana Blues Band, and the rest as they say is history. One of the major guitarists of his generation, Santana's music combines sophisticated Latin rhythms, lusty blues and a new age spiritual orientation.

Born a prince to the royal family of Ondo in Nigeria, West Africa, King Sunny Ade (known simply as "Chairman" Sunny Ade in Lagos, Nigeria) has released more than fifty albums over the past decade and toured internationally, bringing the message of juju music to the world. Based on a complex call and response between the singers and the drummers, King Sunny Ade added electric guitars (including pedal steel

Rounding out the explorations of world beat music, is The Meters, New Orleans' premiere funk band. The recently reformed foursome consists of keyboardist Art Neville, guitarist Leo Nocentelli, bassist George Porter Jr. and drummer David Russell Batiste Jr. (who filled in the chair formerly occupied by Joseph "Zigaboo" Modeliste). Originally formed in 1966, Allen Toussaint hired them in 1968 as the house band

for SeaSaint Recording studios. Beginning in 1969, The Meters began recording under their own name and proceeded to define New Orleans funk for the next decade. Around 1989 the group reformed with three of the
