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
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
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
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


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


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New Orleans Jazz Festival 2003 Mahalia by James Michalopoulos.

The most spiritual - and spirited - voice of the 20th Century belonged to the late, great pioneering interpreter of gospel music, Mahalia Jackson. This New Orleans native had a huge impact on a more earthly plane: influencing the rock and roll of Little Richard, launching the career of accompanist Billy Preston, winning a Lifetime Achievement Grammy, being inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and, against all odds, landing a gospel song on Billboard's Top 100. Her devotional rapture is captured by James Michalopoulos' portrait. Mahalia performed at the first Festival's Congo Square site in 1970. Although she passed away in 1972, the artist imagines her performing at the contemporary Festival. Michalopoulos' magnificent silk-screen print is his third for the Festival, after his 2001 portrait of Louis Armstrong and 1998 poster of Dr. John.

The Eureka Brass Band, a leading brass band in New Orleans for 55 years (1920-1975), featured many notable New Orleans players including a cornet player and sometime leader named "Sweet Lips Willie" Pajaud. In 1970, the band, minus Willie Pajaud who passed on in 1960,

played the first New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival and second lined with Mahalia Jackson. Pajaud's son Bill was born five years after the band was formed and grew up with it. Today Bill Pajaud is considered one of the foremost artists of his generation, recognized for masterfully preserving the spiritual essence of the New Orleans brass band tradition. His stately portrait of his father's band commemorates Eureka's performance at the birth of the Jazz Festival.

Tague Richardson: 30 Years of Building the Festival

In 1973, the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival moved to the Fair Grounds Race Course and Tague Richardson showed up to teach us how to design and build a festival. He's been doing it ever since. 2003 will mark his 3oth year of producing the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival, longer than anyone else except for George Wein and Quint Davis.

As Site Director at the Fair Grounds, Tague literally designs the entire complex, a temporary city of 100,000 that is the fourth largest in Louisiana! He is also recognized as the Festival's spiritual leader, keeping the

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

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


has since come to be regarded as the largest educational and entertainment prototype of its kind, worldwide.






Of course, countless other treats await those who have made their way from near and far to experience the magic of the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival.

For 34 years, the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Foundation, Inc., a 501(c) 3 non-profit corporation, has proudly presented the New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival, the signature event that epitomizes the Foundation's mission — to promote, preserve, perpetuate and encourage the music, arts, culture, and heritage indigenous to the New Orleans area.

The Foundation's long-standing commitment to the culture of New Orleans and Louisiana has been the driving force behind its participation in the development of numerous programs and community service initiatives, including:

WWOZ, the radio station that promotes New Orleans music internationally, is both subsidized and has its broadcast license held by the Foundation;

A Community Grants program, which has awarded more than \$1 million since the mid-1980s to individuals and arts organizations, usually on a bi-annual basis, depending upon the availability of funds:

The Heritage School of Music, which under the direction of Edward "Kidd" Jordan, provides music instruction to middle and senior high school students:

The Jazz Journey Concert Series presents several concerts and educational workshops during the year featuring renowned jazz artists;

The Tom Dent/Congo Square Lecture Series features nationally known artists, lecturers and entertainers discussing their craft or area of expertise;

Neighborhood Street Festivals brings free music events to the Tremé, Carrollton, Lower Ninth Ward, and Uptown communities throughout the year;

S.E.E.D. (Supporting Enfranchising Economic Development), a micro-

lending program for the start-up of small, economically disadvantaged businesses:

The Musicians' Clinic provides preventative health care to New Orleans-area musicians in partnership with the LSU Healthcare Network and Daughters of Charity;

The Workshop Series, a longstanding part of the annual Jazz & Heritage Festival, that brings musicians into local schools and universities to interact with students in a seminar or assembly setting;

"Raisin' The Roof," a homeownership initiative for musicians and artists, in partnership with area banks and city agencies;

School Day at the Fest provides an opportunity for more than 4.000 kids to receive special, targeted programming and attend the Festival on Thursday of the second weekend;

Community Outreach offers free or discounted Festival tickets to


non-profit and community groups throughout the metropolitan area;


Internship and Mentoring Program, an employment and training initiative that places local college and high school students into all phases of the Festival's production;

The Foundation Archive gathers documentation of all the Foundation's enterprises, with a special focus on media-related materials about the Festival;

JazzNet, with the Contemporary Art Center, this endowment by the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation with support funding by the NEA, further enhances jazz programming and presentation, artist residencies and new works:

Special financial assistance to Social Aid & Pleasure Clubs (for parade permits, police services, etc.) in the interest of public safety during marching parade season.

ahalia Jackson, the first lady of gospel, one of the most inspired voices of the 20th

most inspired voices of the 20th Century and New Orleans' native daughter, returned home to herald the first Jazz Fest in 1970. From the relatively modest stages set up in Congo Square, she sang and marched in a second-line parade with the Eureka Brass Band, Duke Ellington and other distinguished guests as they celebrated a new tradition.

Jackson's throaty contralto and subtly bluesy phrasing brought gospel to the world. She joined Thomas Dorsey, the father of gospel music, for early tours in the 1930s and later went on to place a gospel song (He's Got the Whole World in His Hands) on the Billboard Top 100 for the first time. Throughout her career, she stayed true to traditional gospel, never crossing-over into R&B or departing her spiritual grounding for more widespread commercial success. She even turned down an invitation from Louis Armstrong to join his band. Instead, she went on to give the first gospel performance at Carnegie Hall (1950) and sang for audiences in Europe, Africa, India and Japan.


Her voice never ceased to inspire. Little Richard and musicians in the burgeoning rhythm and blues and rock and roll scene took cues from her intense, passionate singing. The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame inducted her as a member, and she collected a lifetime achievement Grammy Award. She sang for presidents, including at the inauguration of John F. Kennedy. She preceded Martin Luther King, Jr. at the March on Washington before his "I have a Dream" speech. At his funeral, she sang Precious Lord.

Like Louis Armstrong, Jackson went from one of the Crescent City's impoverished neighborhoods to international fame. The premier interpreter of gospel music, she became its greatest ambassador. She set a shining example for the uplifting power of music.

Louisiana's blues legacy by Ben Sandmel



ouisiana really has the blues. From Shreveport to Lake Charles, from Monroe to New Orleans, from ultra-modern styles to archaic traditional forms, this bedrock genre resonates throughout the land of Leadbelly, Little Walter, and Louis Armstrong. What's more, Louisiana blues infuses many other native sounds, including zydeco and Cajun music, swamp pop, and New Orleans jazz and R&B.


Each year, Jazz Fest honors Louisiana's diverse blues legacy by presenting a broad cross-section of blues and blues-related artists from around the state. These local luminaries are complemented by kindred-spirit performers, from outside Louisiana, whose music has strong cultural connections. Selected blues highlights for Jazz Fest 2003 are considered in this brief musical travelogue, with comprehensive information appearing elsewhere in these pages.

Shreveport, in Louisiana's northwest corner, has long been an important hub of blues activity. During the early twentieth century, the powerful singer and guitarist known as Leadbelly (Huddie Ledbetter) honed his chops in the rowdy confines of Fannin Street. Leadbelly used the name of this Shreveport thoroughfare as the title for one of his memorable songs, alongside such signature pieces as Goodnight, Irene and The Midnight

Special. Leadbelly's hard-driving acoustic approach — and the work of such other fine Shreveport guitarists as the late Jesse Thomas — will be celebrated by blues-belter Dorothy Prime, accompanied by the all-acoustic band, The Wampus Catz. Shreveport's active blues scene will also be represented by guitarist Jerry Beach — who wrote I'll Play the Blues for You for Albert King — and the power trio known as The Bluebirds, featuring slide guitarist Buddy Flett.

Heading east on Interstate 20, the city of Monroe (home of the annual Louisiana Folklife Festival) nurtures roots music of all types. Look for guitarist/pianist Kenny Bill Stinson to play a wide range of blues, seamlessly intertwined with rockabilly, country, and originals. In the Louisiana Delta town of Tallulah, between Monroe and the Mississippi guitarist Rufus "Rip" River, Wimberly has spent decades working the local clubs and juke joints. Much of Wimberly's repertoire focuses on '50s/'60s blues hits by Jimmy Reed, Muddy Waters, and B. B. King. With a little coaxing, Wimberly might also play some old ragtime and hokum tunes that date back to his childhood.

Several prominent expatriates from the state of Mississippi, just across the river, will perform at Jazz Fest this year. Guitarist David "Honeyboy" Edwards, a running buddy of the great Robert Johnson, made his first recordings for folklorist Alan Lomax back in 1942. (On that same folk-song collecting trip, conducted for the Library of Congress, Lomax also recorded a then-unknown blues artist named Muddy Waters.) Now based in



Chicago, "Honeyboy" is still going strong at age 88, playing acoustic guitar in a distinctive, intensely rhythmic Delta style.

Edwards was also a colleague of the seminal Delta guitarist Son House, the hands-on, slide-guitar mentor of both Robert Johnson and, years later, John Mooney.

At 89, pianist Joe Willie "Pinetop" Perkins is another feisty veteran of Mississippi/Chicago continuum. Perkins spent years working with Muddy Waters, and will appear at Jazz Fest accompanied by two bandmates from that prestigious gig - guitarist Bob Margolin, and drummer Willie "Big Eyes" Smith. Also hailing from Chicago - by way of the North Mississippi hill country around Holly Springs - are Jimmy and Syl Johnson. These "brothers Johnson" are sophisticated pioneers of contemporary blues/funk. Both are soulful, soprano vocalists, and Jimmy is a hot guitarist as well. In addition, a fine young blues/jam band has emerged from these hills the aptly-named North Mississippi All-Stars.

Detouring, momentarily, to the mid-Atlantic states, Maryland's


venerable acoustic guitarist Warner Williams will debut at Jazz fest this year. Williams' intricate playing draws on the Piedmont and Tidewater blues styles, along with some urban jazz influences. Also debuting are The Holmes Brothers—native Virginians, now based in New York City—whose blues repertoire ranges into rock, R&B, country, Gospel, and beyond.

Downstream from the Delta, the Mississippi River rolls on to the blues-rich city of Baton Rouge. Chicago guitarist Buddy Guy, a native of neighboring Pointe Coupee Parish, started out in the blues clubs of Louisiana's capital. Atypically for this live-wire performer, Guy's first public appearance was a flop. "When I was 18, I was pumping gas in Baton Rouge," Guy recalls. "I got hired at a club, for more money than I was making on my day job. But I was shy. I couldn't face people when I played. I played Work With Me, Annie with my face to the wall. They told me 'quit joking, and turn around!' I got fired and went back to the gas pumps. Three years later I moved to Chicago and finally got over my stage fright."

Guy is just one of many blues stars to emerge from Baton Rouge. Other notables include the late singer and harmonica blower, Slim Harpo known for such hits as Baby, Scratch My Back and Raining In My Heart and the late guitarist/vocalist Lightnin' Slim, of Rooster Blues fame. Both of these Slims scored their hits on a Nashville-based label called Excello Records. Accordingly, their distinctive swamp-blues styles along with that of other Baton Rouge artists such as harmonica ace Lazy Lester - came to be known collectively as "the Excello sound." This designation obscured the Louisiana origins of these fine musicians, as well as the fact that they recorded locally. To further confuse matters, the late Guitar Slim was tremendously popular on the New Orleans blues scene during the '50s, propelled by such hits as *The Things That I Used To Do*.

Excello Records is long gone, but Baton Rouge blues artists continue to find fame—witness Chris Thomas King, who rose to prominence following his appearance in O Brother, Where Art Thou? In addition to King and Buddy Guy, Baton Rouge blues will be well-represented at Jazz Fest: by pianist Henry Gray, who spent years playing with Howlin' Wolf; urbane singer Luther Kent, and his big band, Trick Bag; and various members of the Neal dynasty, led by harmonica patriarch Raful Neal, Sr.

New Orleans is not generally regarded as an important blues city, per se. Hometown artists such as guitarist Little Freddie King do perform in a straight-ahead style, however, while harmonica veterans including J. Monque'd and Jumpin' Johnny Sansone also honor the old school. But the blues was a key component in the early jazz of Louis Armstrong and colleagues, and it remains prominent in the work of





many of today's jazz traditionalists, including clarinetist Dr. Michael White, and trombonist Jimmy Cheatham. Blues is equally integral in the work of such New Orleans R&B piano icons as Fats Domino, Eddie Bo, and Dr. John, while hometown

R&B guitarists Walter "Wolfman" Washington and Snooks Eaglin pack plenty of blues into their eclectic repertoires. A fair warning to blase poseurs who feign nonchalance during one of Eaglin's eccentric, animated sets: if audience response seems insufficient, Snooks is apt to shout "wake up, goddammit, this ain't no funeral parlor!" — right in the middle of a solo.

Louisiana's Cajun and Creole parishes lie west of New Orleans and Baton Rouge, across the great Atchafalaya Swamp. In the countryside and the modern cities of Lafayette and Lake Charles alike, many people still speak French—and they still sing it, too, in Cajun music and zydeco. At its core, zydeco combines Afro-Caribbean folk roots with African-American blues and soul. This blend was pioneered in

the late 1940s by the likes of Clifton Chenier, and will be heard in the blues-drenched repertoire of such accordionists as C.J. Chenier, Poncho Chavis, Thomas "Big Hat" Fields, Nathan Williams, and Geno Delafose, among others.

Blues also figures in the old-time style of Goldman Thibodeaux, whose music predates zydeco and is known as "la-la" or "la musique Creole." Besides accordionists, zydeco has produced such hot guitar soloists as Paul "Little Buck" Senegal, Sherman Robertson, and Sonny Landreth. And the world's pre-eminent blues harmonica player, the late Little Walter, was born and raised in Cajun/ Creole country.

Cajun music, zydeco's white counterpart, encompasses French and Acadian folk songs, mainstream country, western swing, and the



blues. Michael Doucet. BeauSoleil, has always incorporated blues into both his fiddling and vocal phrasing. Belton Richard's poignant Cajun crooning is mood indigo all the way, and he is also an exquisite interpreter of swamp-pop. This term was coined in the '70s to describe R&B and rock recorded in south Louisiana during the '50s and '60s. Structurally identical to mainstream rock and R&B of the day, these performances were distinguished their plaintive, soulful vocals.

Perhaps the best-known example of swamp-pop is Phil Phillips' Sea of Love, which was recorded in Lake Charles and hit the national Top Ten in 1959. Belton Richard's Un Autre Soir D'Ennui is unknown nationally but remains a perennial favorite in south Louisiana. Swamp-pop is a

principle ingredient in the fine music of L'il Band 'o' Gold, featuring the great singing drummer Warren Storm. And all of these southwest Louisiana styles — along with New Orleans R&B — are expertly embraced by pianist and singer Marcia Ball.


Ball is a native of Vinton, La, between Lake Charles and the Texas line. This border region also gave the world one Clarence "Gatemouth" Brown. Brown is an accomplished multi-instrumentalist with nearly 60 years of professional experience. While Brown plays swing, country, Cajun music, and more, he's best known as a blues guitarist — but that label makes him bristle. Call Gatemouth a jazz sophisticate or a roots-music master, unless you're looking for trouble.


Finally, there's a strong blues

element in the original music of Charles native Lucinda Williams, Williams, who has also lived in Lafayette and New Orleans, is a devotee of rural blues and gospel stylists including Little Son Jackson and Reverend Pearly Brown. Her evocative lyrics make frequent references to south Louisiana, and pay homage to her musical icons: "We used to drive from Lafayette to Baton Rouge, in a yellow El Camino, listenin' to Howlin' Wolf..." Imagine just taking such a spin as you cruise for blues at Jazz Fest.

Herman Leonard


hotographer Herman Leonard created one of the premier picture archives of jazz. His collection is housed in the Smithsonian Institution in Washington D.C. Now a resident of New Orleans, the just turned 80-year-old Leonard continues to photograph famous and destined-to-be famous jazz musicians.

The jazz scene in New York first


The jazz scene in New York first beckoned to him in the late 1940s. In clubs from Broadway and 52nd Street to Harlem, he captured Charlie Parker, Dizzy Gillespie, Billie Holiday, Duke Ellington and many others. Leonard put those photos away while he worked as Marlon Brando's personal photographer, went to Paris to do fashion and advertising and worked for European Playboy. But in the 50s, he rediscovered the negatives and the subject of jazz regained his attention.

His first jazz exhibition was staged in London in 1988. Since then his name and work have become a part of jazz history and contemporary popular culture.



Allen Toussaint

Legendary producer and pianist Allen Toussaint is behind enough hits to create his own personal top 100, from Ernie K-Doe's Mother-In-Law to Al Hirt's Java to Dr. John's Right Time Wrong Place to Labelle's Lady Marmalade. Though mostly he is known for his R&B work, he doesn't see anything startling about setting his sights on a jazz project.

"In New Orleans, we have a jazzy garden so, of course, the plants are jazzy," he says. "Whether it's an azalea or a rose."

Toussaint has been working on a jazz recording of his own and will perform its material at the Jazz Fest this year.

From his earliest interest in playing piano, Toussaint has not seen boundaries for a musician. By 12 years old, he was playing in barrooms to help support his family.

"When I was a child learning to play the piano, I thought all musicians played everything," he says. "Anything you heard for an instrument you would play."

New Orleans' Professor Longhair was Toussaint's first real inspiration, bringing him into the rollicking local rhythm and blues scene. He also listened to the recordings of Ray Charles and drew from everything he heard. At the age of 17, Toussaint was plucked by Dave Bartholomew to help with recording for Fats Domino. Toussaint filled in piano parts while Fats was on the road. But he developed his own style of funky, piano-led dance music.

Toussaint develped a passion for producing and spent much of his career crafting hits for other musicians. In his early 20s, he became the powerhouse songwriter and arranger for Minit Records' cast of artists. His early work included hits like Irma Thomas' It's Raining and Lee Dorsey's Working in a Coal Mine. He penned the tunes Southern Nights, which became a hit for Glen Campbell, and Whipped Cream for Herb Alpert.

It wasn't long before musicians were beating a path to New Orleans to record and Toussaint was one of the prime reasons. While more eccentric musicians became stars, the soft-spoken, always dapperdressed Toussaint did more than anyone to define New Orleans rhythm and blues.

Later, Toussaint helped launch the Meters, after he and Marshall Sehorn found them on Bourbon Street as Art Neville and the Neville Sound. They invited the band in to the studio to be the house band backing other talents but then recognized their potential.

Together with Sehorn, Toussaint set up Sea-Saint Studios. There they worked with Paul McCartney, Paul Simon, Joe Cocker, and many more. In his career, Toussaint has also worked with Otis Redding, Bonnie Raitt, the Rolling Stones, Elvis Costello and Robert Palmer. The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame inducted him in 1998.

The jazz project brings jazz arrangements to some R&B hits and New Orleans sounds, including It's Raining. He even found a Meters tune that he's turned around for jazz. For such a prolific songwriter, it's one of the rare recording projects focusing on himself. The show is also one of the rare concerts Toussaint performs. Though he's one of the city's most recognizable faces and greatest influences on its music, Toussaint takes it all in stride and lets the songs speak for themselves.

Roland Guerin

Roland Guerin has been blessed with good opportunities. While many local jazz men like Donald Harrison and Terrence Blanchard went to New York and Los Angeles to establish themselves in the jazz world, Guerin had opportunities come to him.

"Before I left Southern [University], I joined Mark Whitfield's band," Guerin says. "Before graduation, he gave me a list of dates and that turned into six years."

Guerin went on to work closely with Ellis Marsalis and Marcus

Roberts as well and has never has to move from his Baton Rouge home. He is a seasoned traveler, however, and has spent recent months everywhere from New York's Blue Note to the Berlin Philharmonic to collaborations with the New Japan Philharmonic in Osaka.

His signature slap bass technique earned him a spotlight and has helped establish him among top bass players.


"There's certain things I am working toward," he says. "My rhythms are growing. I'm playing slap bass on upright and electric. There are different polyrhythms in each technique. My style is coming out in the phrasing."

Guerin wasn't always sure he would play bass or even jazz. He started out on viola, coming from a musical family led by his mother's zydeco and blues playing. In high school, he was working out three-part harmonies in a rock band. And he almost went to college for music at Berklee before accepting advice from Lee Fortier to study under Alvin Batiste at Southern.

"He believed in bringing personality into fruition. Take the voice in you and bring it to maturity," Guerin says.

While he knew he was going to be a musician his focus developed over time. As he's become more interested in writing and recording, he has defined his work and opened new possibilities.

"My writing is modern jazz," he says. "I also learned pop, rock, funk, blues. All this comes out when I write."







new orleans beats



NewBirth Brass Band

Drummer Cayetano "Tanio" Hingle had the same reaction to the new sounds of the Dirty Dozen Brass Band as visitors do to the traditional music of his NewBirth Brass Band when they play Convention events.

He cocks his head to one side, scrunches his broad smile and mocks a nasal-voiced confusion, "What all's that?"

But it doesn't take long for even the most unfamiliar audiences to find the dancing steps to When the Saints Go Marching In.

Hingle learned classic hymns and dirges from the legendary Olympia Brass Band. He also got hooked on the new sounds of a new wave of brass bands when funk and R&B were added in the mid-'70s.

"I looked at that and I said, 'I'm in,'" he laughs. "I thought we were going to have to walk our whole lives."

The life of a brass band was marching. The groups played jazz funerals and the celebratory Social Aid & Pleasure Club parades. Though the new bands had learned from staunch traditionalists, they wanted to try new styles.

The NewBirth came together in 1988. The line-up has changed over the years, but the current group has been together for five years. They play a weekly mix of Sunday parades, nightclub gigs, convention or public events and weddings.

The NewBirth has incorporated rap, hip hop, funk and soul. They also stick up for the tradition.

"The younger generation is going straight into the new sound." Hingel says. "For some gigs, you can't call a guy if he doesn't know Sunny Side of the Street."

Bamboula 2000

To Luther Gray, the percussionist behind Bamboula 2000, drumming is history.

"We were trying to find the bamboula rhythm from Congo Square. We listened to old songs. We talked to Danny Barker. Then we met Chief Bay from New York. He knew the bamboula," Gray says. "It was the second line. It was never lost in New Orleans."

The Chicago-born percussionist came to New Orleans in 1982 and soaked up the city's music, culture and history. That led to Congo Square, where slaves were allowed to make music under colonial laws.

For Bamboula 2000, it's a chance to unite drumming, singing and African dance.


Gray originally put together drumming workshops incorporating rhythms from Cuba and Brasil to Africa and the Caribbean.

"The purpose of drummers and dancers is to bring peace to the village," he says. "The village is your church, your school, your community. We hope we've influenced a new generation of drummers."

rock & blues



Chris Thomas King

Chris Thomas King is at a crossroads in the blues. No blues artist straddles the past and future of blues quite like him.

"I was the last blues artist of the 20th century discovered by a folklorist," he says.

The son of Baton Rouge blues legend Tabby Thomas, King learned a variety of instruments while hanging out in his father's club, Tabby's Blues Box. In his early teens, he was sitting in with blues greats. Folklorist Nick Spitzer heard him play and told Arhoolie Records that he was the future of the blues.

In 1986, King put out his first album and then jumped to Warner Brothers. Artistic differences over the direction of the blues led King to walk away from the deal to pursue his vision, incorporating sampling, hip hop, rapping and urban sounds. Though King's 1992 release 21st Century Blues From the Hood was a

defining point personally, the fusion was ahead of its time. Unable to get out of a contract, King went to Europe where he started out the hard way, sleeping on park benches.

By the late '90s, King realized his early experiments were being tried by other artists, played on the radio and pushed by labels back home. King returned and continued to record. A break came by way of the movie O Brother, Where Art Thou, in which he played Tommy Johnson. The soundtrack gave him the means to launch his own label. The debut release Dirty South Hip Hop Blues put King back in the forefront.

"My music has always been edgy. Always street," he says. While many have not embraced the urban directions, King says the culture of the blues is still in touch with that experience.

"I'm touring and making hip-hop blues records," he says. "I am the bridge that brought blues back to a young urban base."

George Porter

The inauspicious founding of the Meters in the mid-'60s started the career of one of funk's most influential bands. The project ended before most people realized.

"I don't think by the time the band broke up we realized how strong our reputation was," bassist George Porter says. "We were really striving for something."

The band was playing on Bourbon Street as Art Neville and Neville Sound when Allen Toussaint and Marshall Sehorn hired them for studio work. They also recorded four songs of their own, the seminal Sophisticated Cissy, Cordova, Cissy Strut and Ride Your Pony.

"We went back to Bourbon Street." Porter says. "A few months later Marshall called us back to sign papers and handed us a check."

The Meters were off and by the early '70s were on tour with the Rolling Stones. They would become one of hip hop's most sampled bands. But internal differences arose and the band split. The possibility of a reunion is floated almost annually, though some contractual differences make it doubtful.

Porter has assembled several bands including versions of his Pardners, and the new project PBS, which preach the New Orleans syncopated beats and thick funk. He's also become an avidly sought-after hired gun for recording and touring.

Gov't Mule approached Porter in the wake of bassist Allen Woody's death to play on a tribute album collaboration. Porter became one of the jam band's fan favorites.

Fredy Omar

Fredy Omar has been in the right place at the right time. Taking advantage of it has propelled him to the top of New Orleans' Latin scene.

"I came here with no money. No band. I didn't speak English," he says. "I went from singing Latin-Andino music in Jackson Square with a group of guys playing pan flute to being the Latin King of Frenchmen Street. Last year, I sang at Mayor Nagin's inauguration."

Omar realized a passion for music through the traditional and popular music of Honduras. He grew up in Tagucigalpa, Honduras, working in his family's bakery, listening to an eccentric uncle's huge record collection and singing romantic ballads.

While singing with a choir, he got a break when half the group missed their cue in a song with alternating parts. Omar quickly filled in the part by himself. He became a featured soloist, including on a 45. Suddenly, he was treated as a recording artist and invited to sing at festivals.

He arrived in New Orleans for a musical festival in his early 20s.

"When I came here, being in that creative environment practically changed my life," he says. He realized he could change the way he played Latin music.

"I went to Café Brazil and saw a trio – drums, saxophone and bass – and they did all these jazz standards for three hours. I thought I could put together a six-piece Latin band that can stay true to the rhythm and give an improvisational experience."

He put together Fredy Omar con su Banda and carved out a place in the local music scene. Working on their fourth album, he's mixing traditional styles and creative ideas.

"I play Latin music but now we're exposed to other kinds. Merengue mixed with hip hop. Salsa with rock," he says. "If I want to do a fusion, I do Latin jazz because I think that is more creative."

Anders Osborne

You'd never guess gravel-voiced guitarist Anders Osborne didn't grow up in New Orleans. But the Swedish native only noticed his daughter's accent when his son was born just before Mardi Gras.


"She was saying 'Ahndahhhs,'" he says. "I was like, 'No, that's not how you say it."

Osborne has New Orleans vibes running so deep that he hardly notices the unique musical he's put together. For two years, his rock-oriented band has been counterpointed by sousaphonist Kirk Joseph. The former Dirty Dozen tuba player brings the thick bottom notes of the brass bands into the band.

More recently, Osborne played with Big Chief Joseph "Monk" Boudreaux of the Golden Eagles, resulting in the album Bury the Hatchet. Mardi Gras Indian music is one of the strongest influences in New Orleans music in terms of funky beats and call and response singing.

"I play call and response. I heard traditional African music when I was young. Beautiful galloping rhythms, haunting melody," he says. "What Monk does is straight out of Africa."

After 15 years in the Crescent City, Osborne is home, splitting time between his music and spending time with his family. He only became serious about songwriting after he arrived in New Orleans. In his early 20s, he had roamed the world from Europe down to Africa. Hitchhiking in Yugoslavia, he met a fellow traveler from Slidell, just across the lake from New Orleans. It was that friend that drew him to New Orleans. But he stayed when he realized the music and culture were a natural fit.

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cajun & zydeco



Feufollet

School might not seem like a favorite subject for a band of teenagers but for the members of Feufollet, it helped launch a start in Cajun music. French language immersion programs in Lafayette schools reconnected them with their Cajun heritage.

"My grandparents spoke French around the house," Chris Stafford says. "But my mom is just learning."

Aged 15-18, they are one of the first bands of a new wave of Cajun music. They have been influenced by Stafford family friend Steve Riley, one of the young musicians to take up Cajun music in the '70s after a period when it was almost lost.

"I started playing [accordion] when I was 8," Stafford says. "I had an uncle who was learning. I borrowed it from him and found it easier to pick up so he let me use it. Steve Riley made tapes for me to learn off."

The revivalists like Riley, Mitch Reed and Michael Doucet helped inspire new interest.

Now they're playing, recording and singing mostly in French. Both of their CDs have original songs, but they have made a point of rescuing older, more obscure songs as well. While not old enough to drink, they have played dance halls and made a name for themselves at festivals from Louisiana to Nova Scotia. They favor upbeat styles but mix contemporary and traditional songs.

Playing since the average age in the band was 12, they have weathered a couple of personnel changes. The current line-up is set as a couple of members enrolled in college in Lafayette, La. That promises to open new doors as well.

"I'm taking a class with [folklorist] Barry Jean Ancelet," Chris Segura says. "He was talking about the first Festivals Acadiens and how they noticed they needed younger people to carry on the traditions."

Willis Prudhomme

Willis Prudhomme may be the Grandma Moses of zydeco. A lifelong rice farmer in western Cajun Country, he didn't start playing accordion until he was 45.

"People don't believe I'm an old man," he laughs.

Given his boisterous spirit and salty lyrics, it's not hard to see why people want him on the bandstand. Songs like What You Gonna Do When the Meat's All Gone and Big Legged Woman tell of a life as a rice farmer and dance hall musician. Since his 1988 recording of Salty Dog, Prudhomme has turned heads with his older-style Creole music and sly lyrics.

Coming from western Cajun country, Prudhomme was influenced by Cajun musicians. The accordion he plays is a one-note Cajun style instrument with one row of keys. It isn't as suited for the bluesy styles most zydeco players choose. It allows him to play more waltzes.


"Zydeco is kind of skip hop. It's real hot with a lot of bounce," he says. "The older music is straight ahead. Easier to dance to."

He's gone from being a dance hall bandleader to international ambassador of zydeco. Since recording as if he was playing a dance hall, he's put out a steady steam of acclaimed CDs.

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the fat man

After selling 65 million records, in his heyday alone, and gaining international fame as one of the architects of rock and roll, Antoine Fats Domino is still a homebody.

"I live 18 blocks from the home where I was born." Domino says. "I guess I could have lived anywhere but I like New Orleans."

Domino lives in the modest neighborhood where he grew up and where he got his start. From his brother-in-law, who played banjo in Papa Celestin's Dixieland Jazz Band, Domino picked up some piano lessons. He soon found it easy to learn music by ear but never really thought about becoming a musician. But his talents seeped out on the job, as he delivered ice in his neighborhood.

"Everybody used to have a stand-up piano in their house," he says. "If I saw one I would play a note or two."

He was much closer than he thought to a career as a musician. At 21 years old, he was making bed frames for a company on Broad Street while three nights a week he played piano at the Hideaway club in the lower Ninth Ward, along the river. Professor Longhair and other local musicians inspired Domino, though at the time he only played music he learned from records or from others.

Whatever he played, his rollicking barrelhouse style drew crowds, and also Dave Bartholomew, who had been hired by Imperial Records to find talent. He convinced Domino to come to a recording studio. At Cosimo Matassa's legendary J&M Studio, they cut eight songs


during their first session. One of them, *The Fat Man*, went on to sell a million copies, though Domino took it all in stride.

"I just liked to do what I was doing when I made my first record."

Domino and Bartholomew entered into a very productive partnership in the studio. They sent more than 40 hits to the top of the Billboard charts. Seven hit number one, including Ain't That A Shame, Blueberry Hill, Blue Monday, I'm Ready, I'm Walking, I Want to Walk You Home and Walking To New Orleans. During the '50s, Domino sold more records and had more hits than anyone except Elvis Presley.

At first, Domino had no interest in touring but eventually Bartholomew convinced him. They traveled the world and everywhere they went people knew his hits. But he kept his home in New Orleans and shied away from the trappings of his fame. When President Bill Clinton invited him to the White House to accept a National Medal of Arts award, Domino declined.

In spite of his privacy, he's still the same old Fats. Always impeccably dressed, including the heavy gold rings that were an early signature, he steps out to perform a couple of times a year. On stage, he's never lost his broad smile or his energetic style, pounding on the keys and playing his music the way he first recorded it.





CROSBY, STILLS & NASH JOHN HIATT & THE GONERS

David Crosby, Stephen Stills and Graham Nash became Crosby, Stills and Nash in 1968 and their first album, with their signature harmonies, rocketed to the top of the charts. At Woodstock with Neil Young, they solidified a place at the center of their generation and its culture, becoming one of its most beautiful voices. John Hiatt has been a force in rock, playing folk and blues inspired music, since the mid-70s. He put the Goners together in 1988, and has recently released a new album with them. The Bar Is Open.

Saturday, April 26 MICHAEL FRANKS

ANGELA BOFILL

Michael Franks began a career joining jazz and pop in the early '70s in California and was enormously popular by the early '8os. His songs have been covered by everyone from the Carpenters to Patti Labelle. Harlem-born Angela Bofill possessed a stunning voice by the age of 4 and was singing professionally at 15. She developed a jazz and soul fusion style, releasing her first album in the late '70s. She's gone on to work with the biggest names in jazz and pop as she's toured the world.

Saturday, April 26 BOB DYLAN

LUCINDA WILLIAMS

Bob Dylan is one of the most iconoclastic and influential figures in rock and roll. He emerged from New York labeled as a protest singer in the early '60s and turned to electric folk-rock. After the 1966 release Blonde on Blonde sold 10 million copies he reached legendary status, but his career followed many paths as he reached new generations in successive decades. Also with a distinctive voice. Lucinda Williams' folk rock has reached broader audiences in recent years. Her 1998 release Car Wheels on a Gravel Road led to a second Grammy win and being named one of the top 100 women in rock by VH1.

Sunday, April 27

NEW ORLEANS CHICAGO EXPRESS

Featuring Franz Jackson. Sammy Rimington, Mark Braud, Fred Lonzo, James Singleton and Ernest Elly presented by Lars Edegran. Franz lackson is an elder statesmen of Chicago-style jazz. The tenor saxophonist and clarinetist entered the scene in the late '20s and played with everyone from Fats Waller to Earl Hines to Cab Calloway. He leads a steller line-up linking Chicago and New Orleans. He is joined by soloist Sammy Rimington, New Orleans trumpeter Mark Braud, trombonist Fred bassist James Lonzo. Singleton and Ernest Elly on drums. Lars Edegran, a native of Sweden has been active on the New Orleans music scene since 1965.

Monday, April 28 & Tuesday, April 29 SAM BUTERA

& THE WILDEST

Arriving on the scene from the hey day of Bourbon Street, Sam Butera became legendary in Las Vegas. The tenor saxman became one of the most famous of sidemen and worked the nightclub scene from Vegas' Caesar's Palace to New York's Copacabana. Together with Louis Prima and Keely Smith in the late '50s, he ruled Los Vegas and the three became regulars on TV and in the movies. Butera's music is a lively mix of swing and rock 'n' roll.

Friday, May 2 WIDESPREAD PANIC

NORTH MISSISSIPPI ALLSTARS

Playing jam-oriented. improvisational music. Widespread Panic picked up the matle of the Grateful Dead and became road tested. Through touring and encouraging their fans to tape their shows, they built a loyal following. With the 1998 live album Light Fuse, Get Away they found broader audiences and exposure. The North Mississippi Allstars play a Southern blues-amped rock and roll that's also been embraced by the jam scene.

Saturday, May 3

La Noche Latina CARLOS VIVES Y LA PROVINCIA

ALMAS

La Noche Latina celebrates the finest in Latin music. Carlos Vives comes from Colombia's Caribbean Coast. He plays the vibrant, upbeat music of the Caribbean as well as more traditional the sounds of the higher mountain country of the Andes. Ballads and tropical pop off of his latest album Déjame Entrar, which has climbed Billboard's Latin music charts.

Saturday, May 3

AN EVENING WITH INDIA.ARIE AND MUSIQ

India.Arie rocketed to stardom after playing guitar in coffeeshops in college. Her debut Acoustic Soul garnered a stunning seven Grammy nominations. Philly soul singer Musiq won a Grammy for his song Love and is a rising star. His 2000 debut Aijuswanaseing went platinum and he has followed it up with Juslisen.

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


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native american village

The Festival marks its fourth year of showcasing our nation's indigenous cultures in the tranquil charm of the Native American Village. In the Village, you'll hear the sounds of flautists Tommy Wildcat and Hawk Henries while browsing among booths featuring artists from Louisiana to the Pacific Northwest tribes. Converse with demonstrators of traditional Southeastern crafts, relax under the shade canopy of palmetto-thatched chickees, and learn how to play the Native sport of stickball.

The Native American Village Stage welcomes NAMMY (Native American Music Award) winners Jim Boyd, Bill Miller, and Star Nayea. They will be joined by the American Indian Dance Theatre and Ken Rhyne as well as returning favorite, Butch Mudbone. Local Native bands include The Treaters and Kostini. IronMountain Dancers and Red House perform as the Village's featured national drum and dance troupes. Regional dance and drums include Jonny Hawk Creek-Seminole Stomp Dance Performers of Oklahoma and the Carolina Tuscarora Smoke Dancers. Flautists Tommy Wildcat (NAMMY Flautist of the Year) and Hawk Henries add to the line-up. Look for many of these Native artists to perform on stages throughout the festival. For a complete

The music of Martinique comes to Jazz Fest



When the volcanic Mt. Pelée erupted in 1900 and destroyed the capital city of Saint Pierre, the rich musical culture of Martinique was at its peak. A fresh new urban sound called the "beguine" had become the pulse of carnival celebrations and the rhythm of daily life, pushing rural traditions to a supporting role.

With vibrant and unique musical traditions, Martinique is located in the Caribbean in the French Antilles. From the contemporary Carnival music of Plastic System Band to the internationally successful zouk chouv' music played by Marcé et Toumpak, urban sounds rooted in both beguine and Carnival traditions continue to thrive and develop.

In Martinique, every musical style of the past two centuries is being expressed in both popular and traditional interpretations. Created by musicians from Guadeloupe and Martinique, zouk music has become phenomenally influential

throughout French-speaking Africa and the Caribbean. Meanwhile, the urbanization of rural traditions can be heard in the popular zouk chouv' music of the multifaceted Marcé Pago and his group Toumpak. Underneath the external gloss of electric instruments and the savvy clothing fashions of Marcé lies the galloping chouval bwa rhythm. It was developed by Martinicans as an accompaniment to the maneges (carousels) brought to the island by the colonial French. Chouval b'wa, in a more classic expression, lives on in the music of Claude and Joselita Germany and their Chouval B'wa Band and carousel of Martinique.

Some of the songs that animated the Saint Pierre Carnival a century ago are still being played today. Martinique resembles New Orleans in reprising its classic Carnival music, and the medleys played by contemporary Carnival bands like Plastic System Band span the entire history of Martinican Carnival.

The capital city of Fort de France enjoys winding parades through the streets propelled by a fast-paced beguine rhythm called the biguine vidé.

From the early 1960s through the late 1980s, the typical way to hear Carnival music at a parade in Martinique was from sound systems or bands riding on trucks (chars). Recently, groups have returned to walking or marching along the parade route, just like Carnival a century ago. Some, like Plastic System Band, perform in matching costumes and in an orderly formation while others are much less structured, toward informality leaning and interaction with the crowd. Spectators are compelled to "courre le vide" or jump into dance, sing along and follow the parade. This interactive Carnival spirit will be present throughout the festival's celebration of Martiniqe.

Placide Adams — a renowned bassist and drummer who led the Onward Brass Band and played with the New Orleans Dixieland Hall Jazz Band. Adams performed with such musicians as Ruth Brown, Oscar "Papa" Celestin, George Lewis, and Paul Simon; age 73; in New Orleans on March 29, 2003. (Last Festival performance: Sunday, May 5, 2002 — XM Satellite Radio Economy Hall Tent)

Hank Ballard — renowned R&B singer and songwriter who wrote and performed "The Twist," later popularized by Chubby Checker. He had numerous hits with the Midnighters, including "Work With Me, Annie," and "Let's Go, Let's Go. Let's Go." He was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1990; age 67; in Los Angeles, CA on March 2, 2003. (Last Festival performance: Sunday, May 4, 1988 — Fess Stage)
